PROPOSAL ADDENDA

All addenda to this proposal must be applied when calculating bid and certified in the bid packet submitted to the Kentucky Department of Highways. Failure to use the correct and most recent addenda may result in the bid being rejected.

BID SUBMITTAL

Bidder must use the Department's Expedite Bidding Program available on the Internet web site of the Department of Highways, Division of Construction Procurement. (www.transportation.ky.gov/contract)

The Bidder must download the bid file located on the Bid Express website (www.bidx.com) to prepare a bid packet for submission to the Department. The bidder must submit electronically using Bid Express.

JOINT VENTURE BIDDING

Joint venture bidding is permissible. All companies in the joint venture must be prequalified in one of the work types in the Qualifications for Bidders for the project. The bidders must get a vendor ID for the joint venture from the Division of Construction Procurement and register the joint venture as a bidder on the project. Also, the joint venture must obtain a digital ID from Bid Express to submit a bid. A joint bid bond of 5% may be submitted for both companies or each company may submit a separate bond of 5%.

UNDERGROUND FACILITY DAMAGE PROTECTION

The contractor is advised that the Underground Facility Damage Protection Act of 1994, became law January 1, 1995. It is the contractor's responsibility to determine the impact of the act regarding this project, and take all steps necessary to be in compliance with the provision of the act.

SPECIAL NOTE FOR PIPE INSPECTION

Contrary to Section 701.03.08 of the 2012 Standard Specifications for Road and Bridge Construction and Kentucky Method 64-114, certification by the Kentucky Transportation Center for prequalified Contractors to perform laser/video inspection is not required on this contract. It will continue to be a requirement for the Contractor performing any laser/video pipe inspection to be prequalified for this specialized item with the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet-Division of Construction Procurement.

REGISTRATION WITH THE SECRETARY OF STATE BY A FOREIGN <u>ENTITY</u>

Pursuant to KRS 176.085(1)(b), an agency, department, office, or political subdivision of the Commonwealth of Kentucky shall not award a state contract to a person that is a foreign entity required by KRS 14A.9-010 to obtain a certificate of authority to transact business in the Commonwealth ("certificate") from the Secretary of State under KRS 14A.9-030 unless the person produces the certificate within fourteen (14) days of the bid or proposal opening. If the foreign entity is not required to obtain a certificate as provided in KRS 14A.9-010, the foreign entity should identify the applicable exception. Foreign entity is defined within KRS 14A.1-070.

For all foreign entities required to obtain a certificate of authority to transact business in the Commonwealth, if a copy of the certificate is not received by the contracting agency within the time frame identified above, the foreign entity's solicitation response shall be deemed non-responsive or the awarded contract shall be cancelled.

The deadline for posting answers will be 3:00 pm Eastern Daylight Time, the day preceding the Letting. Questions may be submitted until this deadline with the understanding that the later a question is submitted, the less likely an answer will be able to be provided.

The questions and answers will be posted for each Letting under the heading "Questions & Answers" on the Construction Procurement website (<u>www.transportation.ky.gov/contract</u>). The answers provided shall be considered part of this Special Note and, in case of a discrepancy, will govern over all other bidding documents.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR EXCESS MATERIAL SITES AND BORROW SITES

Identification of excess material sites and borrow sites shall be the responsibility of the Contractor. The Contractor shall be responsible for compliance with all applicable state and federal laws and may wish to consult with the US Fish and Wildlife Service to seek protection under Section 10 of the Endangered Species Act for these activities.

ACCESS TO RECORDS

The contractor, as defined in KRS 45A.030 (9) agrees that the contracting agency, the Finance and Administration Cabinet, the Auditor of Public Accounts, and the Legislative Research Commission, or their duly authorized representatives, shall have access to any books, documents, papers, records, or other evidence, which are directly pertinent to this contract for the purpose of financial audit or program review. Records and other prequalification information confidentially disclosed as part of the bid process shall not be deemed as directly pertinent to the contract and shall be exempt from disclosure as provided in KRS 61.878(1)(c). The contractor also recognizes that any books, documents, papers, records, or other evidence, received during a financial audit or program review shall be subject to the Kentucky Open Records Act, KRS 61.870 to 61.884.

In the event of a dispute between the contractor and the contracting agency, Attorney General, or the Auditor of Public Accounts over documents that are eligible for production and review, the Finance and Administration Cabinet shall review the dispute and issue a determination, in accordance with Secretary's Order 11-004. SECRETARY'S ORDER 11-004

FINANCE AND ADMINISTRATION CABINET

Vendor Document Disclosure

WHEREAS, in order to promote accountability and transparency in governmental operations, the Finance and Administration Cabinet believes that a mechanism should be created which would provide for review and assistance to an Executive Branch agency if said agency cannot obtain access to documents that it deems necessary to conduct a review of the records of a private vendor that holds a contract to provide goods and/or services to the Commonwealth; and

WHEREAS, in order to promote accountability and transparency in governmental operations, the Finance and Administration Cabinet believes that a mechanism should be created which would provide for review and assistance to an Executive Branch agency if said agency cannot obtain access to documents that it deems necessary during the course of an audit, investigation or any other inquiry by an Executive Branch agency that involves the review of documents; and

WHEREAS, KRS 42.014 and KRS 12.270 authorizes the Secretary of the Finance and Administration Cabinet to establish the internal organization and assignment of functions which are not established by statute relating to the Finance and Administration Cabinet; further, KRS Chapter 45A.050 and 45A.230 authorizes the Secretary of the Finance and Administration Cabinet to procure, manage and control all supplies and services that are procured by the Commonwealth and to intervene in controversies among vendors and state agencies; and

NOW, THEREFORE, pursuant to the authority vested in me by KRS 42.014, KRS 12.270, KRS 45A.050, and 45A.230, I, Lori H. Flanery, Secretary of the Finance and Administration Cabinet, do hereby order and direct the following:

- I. Upon the request of an Executive Branch agency, the Finance and Administration Cabinet ("FAC") shall formally review any dispute arising where the agency has requested documents from a private vendor that holds a state contract and the vendor has refused access to said documents under a claim that said documents are not directly pertinent or relevant to the agency's inquiry upon which the document request was predicated.
- II. Upon the request of an Executive Branch agency, the FAC shall formally review any situation where the agency has requested documents that the agency deems necessary to



conduct audits, investigations or any other formal inquiry where a dispute has arisen as to what documents are necessary to conclude the inquiry.

- III. Upon receipt of a request by a state agency pursuant to Sections I & II, the FAC shall consider the request from the Executive Branch agency and the position of the vendor or party opposing the disclosure of the documents, applying any and all relevant law to the facts and circumstances of the matter in controversy. After FAC's review is complete, FAC shall issue a Determination which sets out FAC's position as to what documents and/or records, if any, should be disclosed to the requesting agency. The Determination shall be issued within 30 days of receipt of the request from the agency. This time period may be extended for good cause.
- IV. If the Determination concludes that documents are being wrongfully withheld by the private vendor or other party opposing the disclosure from the state agency, the private vendor shall immediately comply with the FAC's Determination. Should the private vendor or other party refuse to comply with FAC's Determination, then the FAC, in concert with the requesting agency, shall effectuate any and all options that it possesses to obtain the documents in question, including, but not limited to, jointly initiating an action in the appropriate court for relief.
- V. Any provisions of any prior Order that conflicts with the provisions of this Order shall be deemed null and void.

SPECIAL NOTE FOR RECIPROCAL PREFERENCE

Reciprocal preference to be given by public agencies to resident bidders

By reference, KRS 45A.490 to 45A.494 are incorporated herein and in compliance regarding the bidders residency. Bidders who want to claim resident bidder status should complete the Affidavit for Claiming Resident Bidder Status along with their bid in the Expedite Bidding Program. Submittal of the Affidavit should be done along with the bid in Bid Express.

NATIONAL HIGHWAY

Be advised this project is on the NATIONAL HIGHWAY SYSTEM.

PROJECT TRAFFIC COORDINATOR (PTC)

Be advised this project is a significant project pursuant to section 112.03.12.

DGA BASE

Unless otherwise noted, the Department estimates the rate of application for DGA Base to be 115 lbs/sy per inch of depth.

FUEL AND ASPHALT PAY ADJUSTMENT

The Department has included the Contract items Asphalt Adjustment and Fuel Adjustment for possible future payments at an established Contract unit price of \$1.00. The Department will calculate actual adjustment quantities after work is completed. If existing Contract amount is insufficient to pay all items on the contract with the adjustments, the Department will establish additional monies with a change order.

SPECIAL NOTE FOR JPC INTERSECTION PAVEMENT

I. DESCRIPTION

Except as specified herein, construct Jointed Plain Concrete (JPC) intersection pavement in accordance with the Department's Standard and Supplemental Specifications, Special Provisions and Special Notes, and Standard and Sepia Drawings, current editions, and as directed by the Engineer. Section references are to the Standard Specifications. Furnish all materials, equipment, labor, and incidentals for:

(1) Removing asphalt and/or concrete pavement and replacing with JPC Pavement; (2) Maintaining and controlling traffic; and (3) All other work specified as part of this contract.

II. MATERIALS

The Department will sample and test all materials according to the Department's sampling Manual. Make the materials available for sampling a sufficient time in advance of their use, to allow for the necessary time for testing, unless otherwise specified in these notes.

A. Maintain and Control Traffic. See Traffic Control Plan.

B. Dense Graded Aggregate. Do not furnish Crushed Stone Base in lieu of DGA.

C. Jointed Plain Cement Concrete Pavement. Use JPC Pavement/24. At Contractor's request and at no additional cost to the Department, the Engineer may approve other high early strength rapid setting concrete. The Department will allow either central mixing or truck mixing.

D. Joint Sealant. Use hot poured elastic, no alternates.

E. Traffic Signal Loops. See Special Notes for Traffic Signal Preformed Loop Replacement.

III. CONSTRUCTION METHODS

A. Maintain and Control Traffic. See Traffic Control Plan.

B. Site Preparation. Be responsible for all site preparation, including but not limited to, incidental excavation and backfilling; removal of all obstructions or any other items; disposal of materials; sweeping and removal of debris; shoulder preparation and restoration; temporary and permanent erosion and pollution control; final dressing, clean

up, and seeding; and all incidentals. Perform all Site Preparation only as approved or directed by the Engineer.

C. Pavement Removal. Consider pavement removal locations and dimensions shown on the drawings to be approximate only; the Engineer will determine exact locations and dimensions at the time of construction. Prior to removal, saw-cut existing asphalt and/or concrete pavement at locations directed by the Engineer to provide a neat edge where new concrete will adjoin existing pavement. Remove existing asphalt and/or concrete pavement, underlying DGA or other stone base if necessary to provide for the specified thickness of the replacement JPC Pavement.

D. Concrete Pavement Replacement. Prior to pavement removal and placing JPC Pavement, obtain the Engineer's approval of proposed method of construction for ensuring and establishing a smooth profile. Immediately after removing asphalt pavement, stabilize the base as directed by the Engineer with DGA and place the replacement JPC in a continuous operation in accordance with the Traffic Control Plan Phasing and as directed by the Engineer. Construct the replacement JPC Pavement with a minimum depth of 10 inches; however, transition the finished grade to match adjacent pavement that is to remain in place; therefore, the actual thickness of the pavement may be greater than 10 inches in some areas. Consolidate the concrete, strike off, machine finish with a vibrating or roller screed, and straightedge the plastic concrete with a straightedge conforming to Section 501.02.18. Test the profile of the finished pavement with a 10 foot straightedge according to Section 501.03.19. Provide positive drainage upon completion of construction.

E. Joint Sealing. Saw, clean, and seal transverse and longitudinal joints as shown on the standard drawings and as directed the Engineer.

F. Traffic Signal Loops. See Special Notes for Traffic Signal Preformed Loop Replacement. Protect lead wires from each loop to the junction box during each phase of the construction sequence at no additional cost to the Department.

G. Disposal of Waste. Dispose of all cuttings, debris, and other waste off the right-ofway at sites obtained by the Contractor at no additional cost to the Department. See Special Note for Waste and Borrow.

H. Pavement Markings. See traffic Control Plan.

I. On-Site Inspection. Prior to submitting a bid, make a thorough inspection of the site and become thoroughly familiar with the existing conditions so that the work can be expeditiously performed after a contract is awarded. The Department will consider submission of a bid as evidence of this inspection having been made. The Department will not honor any claims resulting from site conditions.

J. Property Damage and Restoration. Be responsible for all damage to public and/or private property resulting from the work. Repair or replace all damaged roadway features in like kind materials and design at no additional cost to the Department. Repair or replace damaged private property in like kind materials and design to the satisfaction of the owner.

K. Caution. Consider information shown on the drawings and in this proposal and the types and quantities of work listed are approximate only, and not as an accurate or complete evaluation of the material and conditions to be encountered during construction. The bidder must draw his own conclusion as to the conditions encountered. The Department does not give any guarantee as to the accuracy of the data and no claim will be considered for additional compensation if the conditions encountered are not in accordance with the information shown.

L. Utility Clearance. Determine the location of all underground and overhead utilities prior to construction. It is not anticipated that utility facilities will need to be relocated and/or adjusted; however, in the event that work does require relocation and/or adjustment, the utility companies will work concurrently with the Contractor while relocating their facilities.

M. Final Dressing, Clean Up, and Seeding and Protection. After all work is completed, remove all waste and debris from the construction sites. Remove all temporary shoulder widening and restore disturbed shoulders. Perform Class A final dressing on all disturbed areas. Sow disturbed earthen areas with Seed Mixture No. 1.

N. Coordination of Work. Be advised that other projects may be in progress within or in the near vicinity of this project. Take into consideration that the traffic control of those projects may affect this project and the traffic control of this project may affect those projects. Coordinate the work on this project with the work of the other contractors. In case of a conflict, the Engineer will determine the relative priority to give to work phasing on the various projects.

IV. METHOD OF MEASUREMENT

The Department will measure only the bid items listed. All other items required to complete the construction shall be incidental to the listed bid items.

A. Maintain and Control Traffic. See Traffic Control Plan.

B. Site Preparation. Other than the bid items listed, site preparation will not be measured for payment, but will be incidental to the other items of the work.

C. Remove Pavement. The Department will measure removed asphalt pavement in square yards.

D. JPC Pavement-10 IN/24. See Section 502.04.01 and Section 501.04.01.

E. Joint Sealing. The Department will not measure Joint Sealing for payment, but shall be incidental to the bid item JPC Pavement-10 IN/24.

F. Signal Loops. See Special Notes for Traffic Signal Preformed Loop Replacement.

G. Smooth Dowels, Deformed Tie Bars, and Hook Bolts. The Department will not measure smooth dowels, deformed tie bars and hook bolts, but will be incidental to JPC Pavement-10 IN/24.

IV. BASIS OF PAYMENT

The Department will make payment only for the bid items listed. All other items required to complete the construction shall be incidental to the bid items listed.

A. Maintain and Control Traffic. See Traffic Control Plan.

B. Remove Pavement. Payment at the contract unit price per square yard shall be full compensation for saw cutting, milling and texturing, and removing existing pavement (asphalt and/or concrete); disposing of waste and debris.

C. JPC Pavement-10 IN/24. See Section 502.05.

D. Signal Loops. See Special Notes for Traffic Signal Preformed Loop Replacement.

SPECIAL NOTE FOR STAKING

In addition to the requirements of Section 201, perform the following:

- 1. Contrary to Section 201.03.01, perform items 1-3 usually performed by the Engineer; and
- 2. Verify intersection and lane profile and alignment and prepare a Drainage Development Worksheet to provide for positive drainage upon completion of construction; and
- 3. Prior to incorporating into the work, obtain the Engineers approval of all designs and revisions to be provided by the Contractor; and
- 4. Produce and furnish to the Engineer "As Built" plans; and
- 5. Perform any and all other staking operations required to control and construct the work.

SPECIAL NOTES FOR TRAFFIC SIGNAL PREFORMED LOOP REPLACEMENT

I. DESCRIPTION. Loop replacement shall be performed in accordance with the Department's Standard Specifications (current edition), applicable Standard Drawings, and applicable Special Provisions except as hereafter specified. Article references are to the Standard Specifications.

The Contractor shall furnish all materials, labor, and equipment for the replacement of traffic signal loop(s), and junction boxes (if the contract specifies quantities for this bid item elsewhere), and maintaining and controlling traffic, and all other work specified as part of this contract.

II. MATERIALS. See section 835 of the Standard Specifications.

All preformed loop wire shall be 16-gauge THWN stranded copper, single conductor in a 2-4-2 configuration for Quadrapole and 3 turns for a standard as shown on the Quadrapole and Standard Loop detail. The loop and home run shall be housed in a class A oil resistant heavy-duty reinforced rubber hose with a 250-PSI internal pressure rating. Hose for the loop and home run assembly shall be one continuous piece. The 3/8" I.D. (5/8" O.D.) hose shall be factory assembled. Preformed loops and home runs shall be pre-wired. The loop configurations and homerun lengths shall be assembled for the specific application.

Hose tee connections shall be high temperature synthetic rubber. The tee shall be of proper size to attach directly to the hose, minimizing the glue joints. The tee shall have the same flexible properties as the hose to insure that the whole assembly can conform to pavement movement and shifting without cracking or breaking.

III. CONSTRUCTION. See section 723 of the Standard Specifications.

The electrical contractor shall coordinate with the general contractor and inspector to ensure the loops are installed prior to any milling work being performed. The contractor shall be responsible for the removal of existing lead-in cable.

Preformed Quadrapole Loops, Preformed Loops and Preformed Loop Lead-In locations shall be coordinated with the Contractor and the Engineer prior to any work being performed. The Contractor shall be careful to avoid pavement sections where potholes, cracks, or any other roadway flaws exist.

Hose for the preformed loops and home run assembly shall be one continuous piece and shall be extended splice-free to the controller or junction box. Preformed loop cables shown as extended to junction boxes by means of preformed home run cables shall be spliced into loop lead-in cable at the boxes. Loop lead-in cable shall be extended splicefree from the junction box to controller. The preformed loop dimension shall be 6' x 30' Quadrapole or 6' x 6', as specified. Center and mark each loop in the lane such that its sides are parallel and perpendicular to the direction of traffic.

Each Contractor submitting a bid for this work shall make a thorough inspection of the site prior to submitting his bid and shall thoroughly familiarize himself with existing conditions so that the work can be expeditiously performed after a Contract is awarded. Submission of a bid will be considered evidence of this inspection having been made. Any claims resulting from site conditions will not be honored by the Department.

Information provided in this proposal and the types and quantities of work listed are not to be taken as an accurate or complete evaluation of the material and conditions to be encountered during construction. The bidder must draw his own conclusion as to the conditions encountered. The Department does not give any guarantee as to the accuracy of the data and no claim will be considered for additional compensation if the conditions encountered are not in accordance with the information shown.

It is not anticipated that utility facilities will need to be relocated and/or adjusted; however, in the event that it is discovered that the work does require that utilities be relocated and/or adjusted, the utility companies will work concurrently with the Contractor while relocating their facilities.

Sow all disturbed earthen areas with Seed Mixture No. 1.

Asphalt or Concrete(4 inches or less) Installation

Starting at the tee joint, saw-cut a $\frac{3}{4}$ " wide slot to a depth of 6" below the final surface of pavement for three sides of the loop leaving the center leg and the shortest and farthest leg from the home run tee joint for the last saw-cuts. After the three sides have been saw-cut, lay loop in slot to mark the center leg and the fourth side. Pull the loop out of the slot to saw-cut the center leg and the fourth side. Saw-cut a $\frac{3}{4}$ " wide slot for the center leg and the fourth side slot for the slot to saw-cut the center leg and the fourth side. Saw-cut a $\frac{3}{4}$ " wide slot for the center leg and the fourth side. Saw-cut a $\frac{3}{4}$ " wide slot for the slot with compressed air.

Make the saw-cut for the home run slot from each loop to the transition conduit ³/₄" wide and 6" deep. Clean any debris, water, and loose particles from the slot with compressed air.

Insert the preformed loop wire and home run lead-in into the bottom of the loop slot. Extend the preformed home run lead-in cable splice-free to the junction box or cabinet. No exceptions to this shall be considered.

There shall be a minimum of 6' between loops in adjacent lanes for 12' wide lanes. Once the preformed loop is installed in the roadway, hand place 1" backer rod in the saw slot to ensure preformed loop will not rise out of slot. Contractor shall then fill the saw slot with non-shrink grout until level with road surface. The non-shrink grout shall be incidental to the Loop Saw, Slot and Fill bid item. See Asphalt saw slot detail.

Concrete(with more than 4 inches) Installation

Lay the preformed loop wire and home run lead-in on the compacted aggregate prior to pouring the new concrete. There shall be a minimum of six feet between loops in adjacent lanes for 12 foot wide lanes.

IV. MEASUREMENT. See Section 723.04 in the Standard Specifications.




Loop saw slot and fill shall include sawing, cleaning saw slot as well as furnishing and installing loop sealant, backer rod and non-shrink grout as shown on the details. The contractor shall saw according to the dimensions shown on the detail sheets and not cut out any sections of pavement by over-sawing any slot. The ³/₄" conduit referenced in the Loop Wire Transition details is incidental to this project and not a separate pay item.


Preformed Quadrapole Loops, Preformed Loops and Preformed Loop Lead-In shall include furnishing and installing preformed quadrapole loops, preformed loops and preformed loop lead-in. Items installed in saw slots shall be installed as shown on the Saw Slot detail. All connections and fittings required for a full and complete installation of the loops are incidental to this item.



SPECIAL NOTES FOR LIQUIDATED DAMAGES

In addition to the requirements of Section 108.09, the Department will assess Liquidated Damages in the amount of \$2,000 per hour for each hour or part of an hour a lane closure remains in place during days and hours prohibited by the Traffic Control Plan or the Engineer.

The Department will assess Liquidated Damages in the amount specified in Section 108.09 if the work is not complete prior to the Specified Completion Date.

Contrary to section 108.09, the Department will assess Liquidated Damages for the months of December through March.

Contrary to Section 108.09, the Department will assess Liquidated Damages regardless of whether seasonal limitations prohibit the Contractor from performing work on the controlling operation.

All liquidated damages will be applied accumulatively.

All other applicable portions of Section 108 apply.

SPECIAL PROVISION FOR WASTE AND BORROW SITES

Obtain U.S. Army Corps of Engineer's approval before utilizing a waste or borrow site that involves "Waters of the United States". The Corps of Engineers defines "Waters of the United States" as perennial or intermittent streams, ponds or wetlands. The Corps of Engineers also considers ephemeral streams, typically dry except during rainfall but having a defined drainage channel, to be jurisdictional waters. Direct questions concerning any potential impacts to "Waters of the United States" to the attention of the appropriate District Office for the Corps of Engineers for a determination prior to disturbance. Be responsible for any fees associated with obtaining approval for waste and borrow sites from the U.S. Army Corps of Engineer or other appropriate regulatory agencies.

SPECIAL NOTE FOR TYPICAL SECTION DIMENSIONS

Consider the dimensions shown on the typical sections for pavement and shoulder widths and thickness' to be nominal or typical dimensions. The Engineer may direct or approve varying the actual dimensions to be constructed to fit existing conditions. Do not widen existing pavement or shoulders unless specified elsewhere in this proposal or directed by the engineer.

TRAFFIC CONTROL PLAN

TRAFFIC CONTROL GENERAL

Except as provided herein, traffic shall be maintained in accordance with the current Standard Specifications and the Standard Drawings, current editions. Except for the roadway and traffic control bid items listed, all items of work necessary to maintain and control traffic will be paid at the lump sum bid price to "Maintain and Control Traffic". All lane closures used on the project will be in compliance with the appropriate Standard Drawings. DO NOT use cones for lane closures or shoulder closures. Channelizing drum spacing shall be 20-foot during all phases of construction.

Contrary to Section 106.01, traffic control devices used on this project may be new, or used in like new condition, at the beginning of the work and maintained in like new condition until completion of the work. Traffic control devices used on this project must conform to the *Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices*, current edition.

The Contractor will be responsible for the movement of traffic signals to accommodate the changing traffic control scheme for the duration of the project. Any splicing, wiring, hooks, brackets and all other incidentals required to move the traffic signal heads to accommodate the new traffic control scheme shall be incidental to the pay item maintain & control traffic. Contractor shall notify the Project Engineer and District Traffic Engineer of plans to switch the traffic control phasing 48 hours prior to the operation. District traffic operations will adjust signal timing / phasing as required for the various traffic control schemes.

PROJECT PHASING & CONSTRUCTION PROCEDURES

The Contractor will have three weekends to complete the project. Lane closures will not be allowed during the following days and hours:

> Monday at 5:00 a.m. through Friday at 8:00 p.m. Keeneland Race Days UK Home Football Games November 22-25, 2012 Thanksgiving Day Weekend December 21-25, 2012 Christmas Holiday December 28, 2012-January 1, 2013 New Year's Holiday May 24 – May 27, 2013 Memorial Day Weekend July 4, 2013 Independence Day

The Engineer may specify additional days and hours when lane closures will not be allowed.

The Engineer may permit minor operations that do not require a lane closure and cause little disruption to traffic between the hours of 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. Monday through Friday.

Maintain a minimum of one traffic lane (mainline) in each direction at all times during construction.

The clear lane width shall be <u>12 Feet</u>; however, provide for passage of vehicles of up to 16 feet in width. If traffic should be stopped due to construction operations, and a school bus on an official run arrives on the scene, the Contractor shall make provisions for the passage of the bus as quickly as possible.

The Department will allow night work on this project. Obtain the Engineer's approval of the method of lighting prior to performing night work.

Take these restrictions into account in submitting bid. The Department will not consider any claims for money or grant contract time extensions for any delays to the Contractor as a result of these restrictions.

PUBLIC INFORMATION PLAN

This project is considered a significant project according to Section 112.03.12. The Department will prepare a public information plan. Submit a proposed schedule of lane closures to the Engineer for approval 14 calendar days prior to beginning work. Notify the Engineer immediately and obtain the Engineer's approval of any proposed deviations from the approved work schedule.

CONSTRUCTION PHASING

During all phases, apply temporary striping tape to delineate the appropriate traffic pattern and place detour signs per the attached drawings or as directed by the engineer. Follow the traffic scheme and phasing indicated below. KYTC will entertain proposed alternate traffic schemes and phasing. Submit proposed alternate schemes and phasing to the Section Engineer for review and approval. Liquidated damages will be charged for lane closures in excess of the allowable time as outlined in the phasing. See Special Note for Liquidated Damages.

PHASE A

Close all eastbound lanes on the bypass including the right turn ramp and two westbound lanes of US 60. Keep one lane in each direction on Lexington Avenue during this phase. The Contractor will be permitted to establish lane closures from 8:00 p.m. Friday through 5:00 a.m. Monday morning. See attached phasing drawings.

PHASE B

Close the two ramps going westbound on the bypass completely. Keep all eastbound lanes open on the bypass and all lanes on US 60 and US 60 Business. The Contractor will be permitted to establish lane closures from 8:00 p.m. Friday through 5:00 a.m. Monday morning. See attached phasing drawings.

PHASE C

Close both directions of US 60 completely. Keep the eastbound ramps to US 60 Business and the ramp from westbound US 60 to the bypass. The Contractor will be permitted to establish lane closures from 8:00 p.m. Friday through 5:00 a.m. Monday morning. See attached phasing drawings.

LANE CLOSURES

Do not leave lane closures in place during non-working hours except for the minimum time required for JPC Pavement curing and strength testing. Open JPC Pavement on schedule.

SIGNS

Contrary to Section 112.04.02 and 112.04.03, Low Shoulder Signs will not be measured for payment, but shall be incidental to Maintain and Control Traffic. Contrary to section 112.04.02, only long term construction signs (signs intended to be continuously in place for more than 3 days) will be measured for payment; short term signs (signs intended to be left in place 3 days or less) will not be measured for payment but shall be incidental to Maintain and Control Traffic.

Traffic control signs in addition to normal lane closure signing detailed on the Standard Drawings may be required by the Engineer. Contrary to Section 112, individual signs will be measured only once for payment, regardless of how many times they are set, reset, removed, and relocated for the duration of the project. Replacements for damaged signs or signs directed to be replaced by the Engineer due to poor legibility or reflectivity will not be measured for payment. A quantity of signs has been included for lane shifts and lane splits. These signs will be paid once no matter how many times they are moved or relocated.

Relocate and reset or cover existing permanent signs as required by the work. Obtain the Engineer's approval before removing or covering an existing sign. The Department will not measure relocating and resetting or covering existing permanent signs, but shall be incidental to Maintain and Control Traffic.

COORDINATION OF WORK

The Contractor is advised that other projects may be in progress within or in the near vicinity of this project. The traffic control of those projects may affect this project and the traffic control of this project may affect those projects. The Contractor will coordinate the work on this project with the work of the other contractors. In case of conflict, the Engineer will determine the relative priority for each project.

BARRICADES

Barricades used in lieu of barrels and cones for channelization or delineation will be incidental to Maintain and Control Traffic according to Section 112.04.01. Barricades used to protect pavement removal areas will be bid as each according to Section 112.04.04.

Individual barricades will be measured only once for payment, regardless of how many times they are set, reset, removed, and relocated during the duration of the project. Replacements for damaged barricades or barricades directed to be replaced by the Engineer due to poor legibility or reflectivity will not be measured for payment.

CHANGEABLE MESSAGE SIGNS

Provide changeable message signs in advance of and within the project at locations determined by the Engineer. If work is in progress concurrently in both directions or if more than one lane closure is in place in the same direction of travel, provide additional changeable message signs as directed by the Engineer. Place changeable message signs one mile in advance of the anticipated queue at each lane closure. As the actual queue lengthens and/or shortens, relocate or provide additional changeable message signs so that traffic has warning of slowed or stopped traffic at least one mile but not more than two miles before reaching the end of the actual queue. The Engineer may vary the designated locations as the work progresses. The Engineer will determine the messages to be displayed. In the event of damage or mechanical/electrical failure, repair or replace the Changeable Message Signs within 24 hours. The Department will measure for payment the maximum number of Changeable Message Signs in concurrent use at the same time on a single day on all sections of the contract. The Department will measure individual Changeable Message Signs only once for payment, regardless of how many times they are set, reset, removed, and relocated during the duration of the project. The Department will not measure replacements for damaged Changeable Message Signs or for signs the Engineer directs be replaced due to poor condition or readability.

ARROW PANEL

Use arrow panels as shown on the Standard Drawings or as directed by the Engineer. The Department will measure for payment the maximum number of arrow panels in concurrent use at the same time on a single day on all sections of the contract. Individual arrow panels will be measured only once for payment, regardless of how many times they are set, reset, removed, and relocated during the duration of the project. Replacements for damaged arrow panels directed by the Engineer to be replaced due to poor condition or readability will not be measured for payment.

TYPE I TAPE INTERSECTION MARKINGS

KYTC will provide a final striping plan for all permanent markings following completion of all phases of the work. Place all final markings as directed by the Engineer.

PAVEMENT MARKINGS

Coordinate the installation of all temporary and permanent striping and Durable Type I Tape with the Engineer. The Department will have a revised striping plan prior to construction. A striping plan for the pavement will be provided to the Contractor prior to the installation of any temporary or permanent markings. Do not install temporary pavement striping, permanent pavement striping, and/or Durable Pavement markings without written permission from the Engineer.

Temporary Striping will be installed as per Section 112 with the following exceptions:

- 1. Include edge lines in Temporary Striping; and
- 2. Place Temporary or Permanent Striping before opening a lane to traffic; and
- 3. For Permanent Striping use Durable Tape Type 1.

If the Contractor's operations or phasing requires temporary markings that must be subsequently removed from the final surface course, Temporary Removable Tape shall be used. This removable tape will not be measured separately for payment.

PAVEMENT EDGE DROP-OFFS

A pavement edge between opposing directions of traffic or lanes that traffic is expected to cross in a lane change situation shall not have an elevation difference greater than 1½". Warning signs (MUTCD W8-9 or W8-9A, or W8-11) shall be placed in advance of and at 1500' intervals throughout the drop-off area. Dual posting on both sides of the traveled way shall be required. All transverse transitions between newly surfaced pavement and the existing pavement areas that traffic may cross shall be wedged with asphalt mixture for leveling and wedging. Remove wedges prior to placement of the final surface course.

Pavement edges that traffic is not expected to cross, except accidentally, shall be treated as follows:

Less than 2" - No protection required.

2" to 4" - Place plastic drums, vertical panels, or barricades every 50 feet. Cones may be used in place of plastic drums, panels, and barricades during daylight working hours. Wedge with asphalt mixture for leveling and wedging with a 1:1 or flatter slope in daylight hours, or 3:1 or flatter slope during nighttime hours, when work is not active in the drop-off area.

4 inches and greater – Drop-offs 4 inches or greater will be allowed during duration of the project. Protect with a lane or shoulder closure using drums or barricades; cones will not be allowed for lane or shoulder closures for drop-offs 4 inches or

greater. Place drums or barricades with spacing not to exceed 25 feet. Place Type III Barricades facing oncoming traffic at each drop off. If for any reason traffic must be maintained less than 6 feet from the drop off, wedge with DGA with 3:1 or flatter slope when work is not actively in progress in the drop-off area. Once excavation begins, work continuously to construct DGA and asphalt base to eliminate the drop-off. Drop-offs greater than 4 inches within 6 feet of traffic will not be allowed during non-working hours.

Pedestrians & Bicycles - Protect pedestrian and bicycle traffic as directed by the engineer.

USE AND PLACEMENT OF CHANGEABLE MESSAGE SIGNS

The following policy is based upon current Changeable Message Signs (CMS) standards and practice from many sources, including the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA), other State Departments of Transportation, and Traffic Safety Associations. It is understood that each CMS installation or use requires individual consideration due to the specific location or purpose. However, there will be elements that are constant in nearly all applications. Accordingly these recommended guidelines bring a level of uniformity, while still being open to regional experience and engineering judgment.

Application

The primary purpose of CMS is to advise the driver of unexpected traffic and routing situations. Examples of applications where CMS can be effective include:

- Closures (road, lane, bridge, ramp, shoulder, interstate)
- Changes in alignment or surface conditions
- Significant delays, congestion
- Construction/maintenance activities (delays, future activities)
- Detours/alternative routes
- Special events with traffic and safety implications
- Crash/incidents
- Vehicle restrictions (width, height, weight, flammable)
- Advance notice of new traffic control devices
- Real-time traffic conditions (must be kept up to date)
- Weather /driving conditions, environmental conditions, Roadway Weather Information Systems
- Emergency Situations
- Referral to Highway Advisory Radio (if available)
- Messages as approved by the County Engineer's Office

CMS should not be used for:

- Replacement of static signs (e.g. road work ahead), regulatory signage (e.g. speed limits), pavement markings, standard traffic control devices, conventional warning or guide signs.
- Replacement of lighted arrow board
- Advertising (Don't advertise the event unless clarifying "action" to be taken by driver e.g. Speedway traffic next exit)
- Generic messages
- Test messages (portable signs only)
- Describe recurrent congestion (e.g. rush hour)
- Public service announcements (not traffic related

Messages

Basic principles that are important to providing proper messages and insuring the proper operation of a CMS are:

- Visible for at least ¹/₂ mile under ideal daytime and nighttime conditions
- Legible from all lanes a minimum of 650 feet
- Entire message readable twice while traveling at the posted speed
- Nor more than two message panels should be used (three panels may be used on roadways where vehicles are traveling less than 45 mph). A panel is the message that fits on the face of the sign without flipping or scrolling.
- Each panel should convey a single thought; short and concise
- Do not use two unrelated panels on a sign
- Do not use the sign for two unrelated messages
- Should not scroll text horizontally or vertically
- Should not contain both the words left and right
- Use standardized abbreviations and messages
- Should be accurate and timely
- Avoid filler/unnecessary words and periods (hazardous, a, an, the)
- Avoid use of speed limits
- Use words (not numbers) for dates

Placement

Placement of the CMS is important to insure that the signs is visible to the driver and provides ample time to take any necessary action. Some of the following principles may only be applicable to controlled access roadways. The basic principles of placement for a CMS are:

- When 2 signs are needed, place on same side of roadway and at least 1,000 feet apart
- Place behind semi-rigid/rigid protection (guardrail, barrier) or outside of the clear zone
- Place 1,000 feet in advance of work zone; at least one mile ahead of decision point
- Normally place on right side of roadway; but should be placed closest to the affected lane so that either side is acceptable
- Signs should not be dual mounted (one on each side of roadway facing same direction)
- Point trailer hitch downstream
- Secure to immovable object to prevent thief (if necessary)
- Do not place in sags or just beyond crest
- Check for reflection of sun to prevent the blinding of motorist
- Should be turned ~3 degrees outward from perpendicular to the edge of pavement
- Bottom of sign should be 7 feet above the elevation of edge of roadway
- Should be removed when not in use




- Weekend 1: Complete area labeled "Section B" on the aerial map

Detour Signage Plan



TRAFFIC CONTROL FOR DURABLE PAVEMENT MARKINGS AND THERMOPLASTIC STRIPING

Except as provided herein, maintain and control traffic in accordance with the Standard and Supplemental Specifications and the Standard and Sepia Drawings, current editions. Except for the roadway and traffic control bid items listed, all items of work necessary to maintain and control traffic will be paid at the lump sum bid price to "Maintain and Control Traffic". Contrary to Section 106.01, furnish new, or used in like new condition, traffic control devices at the beginning of the work and maintain in like new condition until completion of the work. Do not install Thermoplastic Markings on bridge decks. Provide egress and ingress to all ramps, side roads, and entrances at all times

TWO-LANE, TWO-WAY ROADWAYS:

Place durable markings and thermoplastic striping according to the Standard Drawings TTS-130-01 and TTS-135-01. Accomplish the work in only one lane and affect the adjacent lane as little as possible. Provide egress and ingress to all ramps, side roads, and entrances at all times. Sign approaches to the immediate work area in accordance with Standard Drawings TTC-100-03 and TTC-105-02. Install the signs on approved temporary mountings.

MULTI-LANE ROADWAYS:

Place durable markings and thermoplastic striping behind stationary lane closures or as a mobile operation. Obtain the Engineer's approval for stationary lane closures prior to use. Sign approved stationary lane closures according to Standard Drawings TTC-115-02 and TTC-125-02. If the Contractor desires an interior lane closure, prepare a plan and obtain the Engineer's approval prior to use. Perform mobile operations according to Standard Drawing TTS-120-01 and TTS-125-01. Install the signs for mobile operations on approved temporary mountings on both sides of the traveled way.

Restrict the work area to not more than one lane of traffic plus 24 inches maximum of only one adjacent lane in each direction of travel. Provide a minimum lane width of 10 feet; however, provide for passage of vehicles of up to 16 feet in width. Limit the length of a lane closure to not exceed 1 mile in urban areas or 3 miles in rural areas as designated by the Engineer. Do not erect more than one lane closure in each direction of travel unless there is at least 2 miles separation between lane closures and both lane closures are in the same lane.

SPECIAL NOTE FOR EROSION CONTROL

I. DESCRIPTION

Except as provided herein, perform all erosion and water pollution control work in accordance with the Department's Standard and Supplemental Specifications, and Standard and Sepia Drawings, current editions, and as directed by the Engineer. Section references are to the Standard Specifications. This work shall consist of:

(1) Developing and preparing a Best Management Practices Plan (BMP) tailored to suit the specific construction phasing for each site within the project; (2) Preparing the project site(s) for construction, including locating, furnishing, installing, and maintaining temporary and/or permanent erosion and water pollution control measures as required by the BMP prior to beginning any earth disturbing activity on the project site; (3) Clearing and grubbing and removal of all obstructions as required for construction; (4) Removing all erosion control devices when no longer needed; (5) Restoring all disturbed areas as nearly as possible to their original condition; (6) Preparing seedbeds and permanently seeding all disturbed areas; (7) Providing a Kentucky Erosion Prevention and Sediment Control Program (KEPSC) qualified inspector; and (8) Performing any other work to prevent erosion and/or water pollution as specified by this contract, required by the BMP, or as directed by the Engineer.

II. MATERIALS

Except as provided herein, furnish all materials for erosion and water pollution control work in accordance with the Department's Standard and Supplemental Specifications, and Standard and Sepia Drawings, current editions, and as directed by the Engineer.

Provide for all materials to be sampled and tested in accordance with the Department's Sampling Manual. Unless directed otherwise by the Engineer, make the materials available for sampling a sufficient time in advance of the use of the materials to allow for the necessary time for testing.

III. CONSTRUCTION

Except as provided herein, construct all erosion and water pollution control work in accordance with the Department's Standard and Supplemental Specifications, and Standard and Sepia Drawings, current editions, and as directed by the Engineer.

Erosion Control Page 2 of 3

Be advised, these Erosion Control Plan Notes do not constitute a BMP plan for the project. Jointly with the Engineer, prepare a site specific BMP plan for each drainage area within the project in accordance with Section 213 and the supplemental specifications. Provide a unique BMP at each project site using good engineering practices taking into account existing site conditions, the type of work to be performed, and the construction phasing, methods and techniques to be utilized to complete the work. Be responsible for all erosion prevention, sediment control, and water pollution prevention measures required by the BMP for each site. Represent and warrant compliance with the Clean Water Act (33 USC Section 1251 et seq.), the 404 Permit, the 401 Water Quality Certifications, and applicable state and local government agency laws, regulations, rules, specifications, and permits. Contrary to Section 105.05, in case of discrepancy between theses notes, the Standard Specifications, interim Supplemental Specifications, Special and Special Notes, Standard and Sepia Drawings, and such state and local government agency requirements, adhere to the most restrictive requirement.

Conduct operations in such a manner as to minimize the amount of disturbed ground during each phase of the construction and limit the haul roads to the minimum required to perform the work.. Preserve existing vegetation not required to be removed by the work or the contract. Seed and/or mulch disturbed areas at the earliest opportunity. Use silt fence, silt traps, temporary ditches, brush barriers, erosion control blankets, sodding, channel lining, and other erosion control measures in a timely manner as required by the BMP and as directed or approved by the Engineer. Prevent sediment laden water from leaving the project, entering an existing drainage structure, or entering a steam.

Provide for erosion control measures to be in place and functioning prior to any earth disturbance within a drainage area. Compute the volume and size of silt control devices necessary to control sediment during each phase of construction. Remove sediment from silt traps before they become a maximum of ½ full. Maintain silt fence by removing accumulated trappings and/or replacing the geotextile fabric when it becomes clogged, damaged, or deteriorated, or when directed by the Engineer. Properly dispose of all materials trapped by erosion control devices at approved sites off the right of way obtained by the Contractor at no additional cost to the Department (See Special Note for Waste and Borrow).


As work progresses, add or remove erosion control measures as required by the BMP applicable to the Contractor's project phasing and construction methods and techniques. Update the volume calculations and modify the BMP as necessary throughout the duration of the project. Ensure that an updated BMP is kept on site and available for public inspection throughout the life of the project.

After all construction is complete, restore all disturbed areas in accordance with Section 212. completely remove all temporary erosion control devices not required as part of the permanent erosion control from the construction site. Prior to removal, obtain the Engineer's concurrence of items to be removed. Grade the remaining exposed earth (both on and off the Right of-Way) as nearly as possible to its original condition, or as directed by the Engineer. Prepare the seed bed areas and sow all exposed earthen areas with the applicable seed mixture(s) according to Section 212.03.03.

Contrary to Section 212.04 and 213.04, the Department will not measure Erosion Control items for separate payment, but shall be incidental to DGA, Asphalt Base and Surface, Leveling and Wedging, and JPC Pavement as applicable



US 60 CURB SECTION





SPECIAL NOTE FOR PORTABLE CHANGEABLE MESSAGE SIGNS

This Special Note will apply when indicated on the plans or in the proposal.

1.0 DESCRIPTION. Furnish, install, operate, and maintain variable message signs at the locations shown on the plans or designated by the Engineer. Remove and retain possession of variable message signs when they are no longer needed on the project.

2.0 MATERIALS.

2.1 General. Use LED Variable Message Signs Class I, II, or III, as appropriate, from the Department's List of Approved Materials.

Unclassified signs may be submitted for approval by the Engineer. The Engineer may require a daytime and nighttime demonstration. The Engineer will make a final decision within 30 days after all required information is received.

2.2 Sign and Controls. All signs must:

- 1) Provide 3-line messages with each line being 8 characters long and at least 18 inches tall. Each character comprises 35 pixels.
- Provide at least 40 preprogrammed messages available for use at any time. Provide for quick and easy change of the displayed message; editing of the message; and additions of new messages.
- 3) Provide a controller consisting of:
 - a) Keyboard or keypad.
 - b) Readout that mimics the actual sign display. (When LCD or LCD type readout is used, include backlighting and heating or otherwise arrange for viewing in cold temperatures.)
 - c) Non-volatile memory or suitable memory with battery backup for storing pre-programmed messages.
 - d) Logic circuitry to control the sequence of messages and flash rate.
- 4) Provide a serial interface that is capable of supporting complete remote control ability through land line and cellular telephone operation. Include communication software capable of immediately updating the message, providing complete sign status, and allowing message library queries and updates.
- 5) Allow a single person easily to raise the sign to a satisfactory height above the pavement during use, and lower the sign during travel.
- 6) Be Highway Orange on all exterior surfaces of the trailer, supports, and controller cabinet.
- 7) Provide operation in ambient temperatures from -30 to + 120 degrees Fahrenheit during snow, rain and other inclement weather.
- 8) Provide the driver board as part of a module. All modules are interchangeable, and have plug and socket arrangements for disconnection and reconnection. Printed circuit boards associated with driver boards have a conformable coating to protect against moisture.
- 9) Provide a sign case sealed against rain, snow, dust, insects, etc. The lens is UV stabilized clear plastic (polycarbonate, acrylic, or other approved material) angled to prevent glare.
- 10) Provide a flat black UV protected coating on the sign hardware, character PCB, and appropriate lens areas.
- 11) Provide a photocell control to provide automatic dimming.

- 12) Allow an on-off flashing sequence at an adjustable rate.
- 13) Provide a sight to aim the message.
- 14) Provide a LED display color of approximately 590 nm amber.
- 15) Provide a controller that is password protected.
- 16) Provide a security device that prevents unauthorized individuals from accessing the controller.
- 17) Provide the following 3-line messages preprogrammed and available for use when the sign unit begins operation:

- 2.3 Power.
- Design solar panels to yield 10 percent or greater additional charge than sign consumption. Provide direct wiring for operation of the sign or arrow board from an external power source to provide energy backup for 21 days without sunlight and an on-board system charger with the ability to recharge completely discharged batteries in 24 hours.

3.0 CONSTRUCTION. Furnish and operate the variable message signs as designated on the plans or by the Engineer. Ensure the bottom of the message panel is a minimum of 7 feet above the roadway in urban areas and 5 feet above in rural areas when operating. Use Class I, II, or III signs on roads with a speed limit less than 55 mph. Use Class I or II signs on roads with speed limits 55 mph or greater.

Maintain the sign in proper working order, including repair of any damage done by others, until completion of the project. When the sign becomes inoperative, immediately repair or replace the sign. Repetitive problems with the same unit will be cause for rejection and replacement.

Use only project related messages and messages directed by the Engineer, unnecessary messages lessen the impact of the sign. Ensure the message is displayed in either one or 2 phases with each phase having no more than 3 lines of text. When no message is needed, but it is necessary to know if the sign is operable, flash only a pixel.

When the sign is not needed, move it outside the clear zone or where the Engineer directs. Variable Message Signs are the property of the Contractor and shall be removed from the project when no longer needed. The Department will not assume ownership of these signs.

4.0 MEASUREMENT. The final quantity of Variable Message Sign will be

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the actual number of individual signs acceptably furnished and operated during the project. The Department will not measure signs replaced due to damage or rejection.

5.0 PAYMENT. The Department will pay for the Variable Message Signs at the unit price each. The Department will not pay for signs replaced due to damage or rejection. Payment is full compensation for furnishing all materials, labor, equipment, and service necessary to, operate, move, repair, and maintain or replace the variable message signs. The Department will make payment for the completed and accepted quantities under the following:

IV. Statements and Payrolls

I. APPLICATION

1. These contract provisions shall apply to all work performed on the contract by the contractor with his own organization and with the assistance of workmen under his immediate superintendence and to all work performed on the contract by piecework, station work or by subcontract. The contractor's organization shall be construed to include only workmen employed and paid directly by the contractor and equipment owned or rented by him, with or without operators.

2. The contractor shall insert in each of his subcontracts all of the stipulations contained in these Required Provisions and such other stipulations as may be required.

3. A breach of any of the stipulations contained in these Required Provisions may be grounds for termination of the contract.

II. NONDISCRIMINATION OF EMPLOYEES

AN ACT OF THE KENTUCKY GENERAL ASSEMBLY TO PREVENT DISCRIMINATION IN EMPLOYMENT KRS CHAPTER 344 EFFECTIVE JUNE 16, 1972

The contract on this project, in accordance with KRS Chapter 344, provides that during the performance of this contract, the contractor agrees as follows:

1. The contractor shall not fail or refuse to hire, or shall not discharge any individual, or otherwise discriminate against an individual with respect to his compensation, terms, conditions, or privileges of employment, because of such individual's race, color, religion, national origin, sex, disability or age (between forty and seventy); or limit, segregate, or classify his employees in any way which would deprive or tend to deprive an individual of employment opportunities or otherwise adversely affect his status as an employee, because of such individual's race, color, religion, national origin, sex, disability or age (between forty and seventy). The contractor agrees to post in conspicuous places, available to employees and applicants for employment, notices to be provided setting forth the provisions of this nondiscrimination clause.

2. The contractor shall not print or publish or cause to be printed or published a notice or advertisement relating to employment by such an employer or membership in or any classification or referral for employment by the employment agency, indicating any preference, limitation, specification, or discrimination, based on race, color, religion, national origin, sex, disability or age (between forty and seventy), except that such notice or advertisement may indicate a preference, limitation, or specification based on religion, or national origin when religion, or national origin is a bona fide occupational qualification for employment.

3. If the contractor is in control of apprenticeship or other training or retraining, including on-the-job training programs, he shall not discriminate against an individual because of his race, color, religion, national origin, sex, disability or age (between forty and seventy), in admission to, or employment in any program established to provide apprenticeship or other training.

4. The contractor will send to each labor union or representative of workers with which he has a collective bargaining agreement or other contract or understanding, a notice to be provided advising the said labor union or workers' representative of the contractor's commitments under this section, and shall post copies of the notice in conspicuous places available to employees and applicants for employment. The contractor will take such action with respect to any subcontract or purchase order as the administrating agency may direct as a means of enforcing such provisions, including sanctions for non-compliance.

III. PAYMENT OF PREDETERMINED MINIMUM WAGES

1. These special provisions are supplemented elsewhere in the contract by special provisions which set forth certain predetermined minimum wage rates. The contractor shall pay not less than those rates.

2. The minimum wage determination schedule shall be posted by the contractor, in a manner prescribed by the Department of Highways, at the site of the work in prominent places where it can be easily seen by the workers.

IV. STATEMENTS AND PAYROLLS

1. All contractors and subcontractors affected by the terms of KRS 337.505 to 337.550 shall keep full and accurate payroll records covering all disbursements of wages to their employees to whom they are required to pay not less than the prevailing rate of wages. Payrolls and basic records relating thereto will be maintained during the course of the work and preserved for a period of one (1) year from the date of completion of this contract.

2. The payroll records shall contain the name, address and social security number of each employee, his correct classification, rate of pay, daily and weekly number of hours worked, itemized deductions made and actual wages paid.

3. The contractor shall make his daily records available at the project site for inspection by the State Department of Highways contracting office or his authorized representative.

Periodic investigations shall be conducted as required to assure compliance with the labor provisions of the contract. Interrogation of employees and officials of the contractor shall be permitted during working hours.

Aggrieved workers, Highway Managers, Assistant District Engineers, Resident Engineers and Project Engineers shall report all complaints and violations to the Division of Contract Procurement.

The contractor shall be notified in writing of apparent violations. The contractor may correct the reported violations and notify the Department of Highways of the action taken or may request an informal hearing. The request for hearing shall be in writing within ten (10) days after receipt of the notice of the reported violation. The contractor may submit records and information which will aid in determining the true facts relating to the reported violations.

Any person or organization aggrieved by the action taken or the findings established as a result of an informal hearing by the Division of Contract Procurement may request a formal hearing.

4. The wages of labor shall be paid in legal tender of the United States, except that this condition will be considered satisfied if payment is made by a negotiable check, on a solvent bank, which may be cashed readily by the employee in the local community for the full amount, without discount or collection charges of any kind. Where checks are used for payments, the contractor shall make all necessary arrangements for them to be cashed and shall give information regarding such arrangements.

5. No fee of any kind shall be asked or accepted by the contractor or any of his agents from any person as a condition of employment on the project.

6. No laborers shall be charged for any tools used in performing their respective duties except for reasonably avoidable loss or damage thereto.

7. Every employee on the work covered by this contract shall be permitted to lodge, board, and trade where and with whom he elects and neither the contractor nor his agents, nor his employees shall directly or indirectly require as a condition of employment that an employee shall lodge, board or trade at a particular place or with a particular person.

8. Every employee on the project covered by this contract shall be an employee of either the prime contractor or an approved subcontractor.

9. No charge shall be made for any transportation furnished by the contractor or his agents to any person employed on the work.

10. No individual shall be employed as a laborer or mechanic on this contract except on a wage basis, but this shall not be construed to prohibit the rental of teams, trucks or other equipment from individuals.

No Covered employee may be employed on the work except in accordance with the classification set forth in the schedule mentioned above; provided, however, that in the event additional classifications are required, application shall be made by the contractor to the Department of Highways and (1) the Department shall request appropriate classifications and rates from the proper agency, or (2) if there is urgent need for additional classification to avoid undue delay in the work, the contractor may employ such workmen at rates deemed comparable to rates established for similar classifications provided he has made written application through the Department of Highways, addressed to the proper agency, for the supplemental rates. The contractor shall retroactively adjust, upon receipt of the supplemental rates schedule, the wages of any employee paid less than the established rate and may adjust the wages of any employee overpaid.

11. No contractor or subcontractor contracting for any part of the contract work which may require or involve the employment of laborers or mechanics shall require or permit any laborer or mechanic in any work-week in which he is employed on such work, to work in excess of eight hours in any calendar day or in excess of forty hours in such workweek unless such laborer or mechanic receives compensation at a rate not less than one and one half times his basic rate of pay for all hours worked in excess of eight hours in any calendar day or in excess of forty hours in such work-week. A laborer, workman or mechanic and an employer may enter into a written agreement or a collective bargaining agreement to work more than eight (8) hours a calendar day but not more than ten (10) hours a calendar day for the straight time hourly rate. This agreement shall be in writing and shall be executed prior to the employee working in excess of eight (8) hours, but not more than ten (10) hours, in any one (1) calendar day.

12. Payments to the contractor may be suspended or withheld due to failure of the contractor to pay any laborer or

mechanic employed or working on the site of the work, all or part of the wages required under the terms of the contract. The Department may suspend or withhold payments only after the contractor has been given written notice of the alleged violation and the contractor has failed to comply with the wage determination of the Department of Highways.

13. Contractors and subcontractors shall comply with the sections of Kentucky Revised Statutes, Chapter 337 relating to contracts for Public Works.

EXECUTIVE BRANCH CODE OF ETHICS

In the 1992 regular legislative session, the General Assembly passed and Governor Brereton Jones signed Senate Bill 63 (codified as KRS 11A), the Executive Branch Code of Ethics, which states, in part:

KRS 11A.040 (6) provides:

No present or former public servant shall, within six (6) months of following termination of his office or employment, accept employment, compensation or other economic benefit from any person or business that contracts or does business with the state in matters in which he was directly involved during his tenure. This provision shall not prohibit an individual from returning to the same business, firm, occupation, or profession in which he was involved prior to taking office or beginning his term of employment, provided that, for a period of six (6) months, he personally refrains from working on any matter in which he was directly involved in state government. This subsection shall not prohibit the performance of ministerial functions, including, but not limited to, filing tax returns, filing applications for permits or licenses, or filing incorporation papers.

KRS 11A.040 (8) states:

A former public servant shall not represent a person in a matter before a state agency in which the former public servant was directly involved, for a period of one (1) year after the latter of:

- a) The date of leaving office or termination of employment; or
- b) The date the term of office expires to which the public servant was elected.

This law is intended to promote public confidence in the integrity of state government and to declare as public policy the idea that state employees should view their work as a public trust and not as a way to obtain private benefits.

If you have worked for the executive branch of state government within the past six months, you may be subject to the law's prohibitions. The law's applicability may be different if you hold elected office or are contemplating representation of another before a state agency.

Also, if you are affiliated with a firm which does business with the state and which employs former state executive-branch employees, you should be aware that the law may apply to them.

In case of doubt, the law permits you to request an advisory opinion from the Executive Branch Ethics Commission, Room 136, Capitol Building, 700 Capitol Avenue, Frankfort, Kentucky 40601; telephone (502) 564-7954.

Unlisted classifications needed for work not included within the scope of the classifications listed may be added after award only as provided in the labor standards contract clauses (29CFR 5.5 (a) (1) (ii)).

The body of each wage determination lists the classification and wage rates that have been found to be prevailing for the cited type(s) of construction in the area covered by the wage determination. The classifications are listed in alphabetical order of "identifiers" that indicate whether the particular rate is union or non-union.

Union Identifiers

An identifier enclosed in dotted lines beginning with characters other than "SU" denotes that the union classification and rate have found to be prevailing for that classification. Example: PLUM0198-005 07/01/2011. The first four letters , PLUM, indicate the international union and the four-digit number, 0198, that follows indicates the local union number or district council number where applicable , i.e., Plumbers Local 0198. The next number, 005 in the example, is an internal number used in processing the wage determination. The date, 07/01/2011, following these characters is the effective date of the most current negotiated rate/collective bargaining agreement which would be July 1, 2011 in the above example. Union prevailing wage rates will be updated to reflect any changes in the collective bargaining agreements governing the rate.

Non-Union Identifiers

Classifications listed under an "SU" identifier were derived from survey data by computing average rates and are not union rates; however, the data used in computing these rates may include both union and non-union data. Example: SULA2004-007 5/13/2010. SU indicates the rates are not union rates, LA indicates the State of Louisiana; 2004 is the year of the survey; and 007 is an internal number used in producing the wage determination. A 1993 or later date, 5/13/2010, indicates the classifications and rates under that identifier were issued as a General Wage Determination on that date.

Survey wage rates will remain in effect and will not change until a new survey is conducted.

WAGE DETERMINATION APPEALS PROCESS

1.) Has there been an initial decision in the matter? This can be:

- * an existing published wage determination
- * a survey underlying a wage determination
- * a Wage and Hour Division letter setting forth a position on a wage determination matter
- * a conformance (additional classification and rate) ruling

On survey related matters, initial contact, including requests for summaries of surveys, should be with the Wage and Hour Regional Office for the area in which the survey was conducted because those Regional Offices have responsibility for the Davis-Bacon survey program. If the response from this initial contact is not satisfactory, then the process described in 2.) and 3.) should be followed.

The request should be accompanied by a full statement of the interested party's position and by any information (wage payment data, project description, area practice material, etc.) that the requestor considers relevant to the issue.

3.) If the decision of the Administrator is not favorable, an interested party may appeal directly to the Administrative Review Board (formerly the Wage Appeals Board). Write to:

4.) All decisions by the Administrative Review Board are final.

END OF GENERAL DECISION

Fringe benefit amounts are applicable for all hours worked except when otherwise noted.

These rates are listed pursuant to the Kentucky Determination No. CR-III-III- HWY dated September 5, 2012.

No laborer, workman or mechanic shall be paid at a rate less than that of a Journeyman except those classified as bona fide apprentices.

Apprentices or trainees shall be permitted to work as such subject to Administrative Regulations adopted by the Commissioner of Workplace Standards. Copies of these regulations will be furnished upon request from any interested person.

Before using apprentices on the job the contractor shall present to the Contracting Officer written evidence of registration of such employees in a program of a State apprenticeship and training agency approved and recognized by the U. S. Bureau of Apprenticeship and Training. In the absence of such a State agency, the contractor shall submit evidence of approval and registration by the U. S. Bureau of Apprenticeship and Training.

The contractor shall submit to the Contracting Officer, written evidence of the established apprenticeship-journeyman ratios and wage rates in the project area, which will be the basis for establishing such ratios and rates for the project under the applicable contract provisions.

TO: EMPLOYERS/EMPLOYEES

PREVAILING WAGE SCHEDULE:

The wages indicated on this wage schedule are the least permitted to be paid for the occupations indicated. When an employee works in more than one classification, the employer must record the number of hours worked in each classification at the prescribed hourly base rate.

OVERTIME:

Overtime is to be paid after an employee works eight (8) hours a day or forty (40) hours a week, whichever gives the employee the greater wages. At least time and one-half the base rate is required for all overtime. A laborer, workman or mechanic and an employer may enter into a written agreement or a collective bargaining agreement to work more than eight (8) hours a calendar day but not more than ten (10) hours a calendar day for the straight time hourly rate. - 3) Employers Liability:
 - a) \$100,000 Each Accident Bodily Injury
 - b) \$500,000 Policy limit Bodily Injury by Disease
 - c) \$100,000 Each Employee Bodily Injury by Disease
- 4) The insurance required above must be evidenced by a Certificate of Insurance and this Certificate of Insurance must contain one of the following statements:
 - a) "policy contains no deductible clauses."
 - b) "policy contains ______ (amount) deductible property damage clause but company will pay claim and collect the deductible from the insured."
- 5) KENTUCKY WORKMEN'S COMPENSATION INSURANCE. The contractor shall furnish evidence of coverage of all his employees or give evidence of self-insurance by submitting a copy of a certificate issued by the Workmen's Compensation Board.

The cost of insurance is incidental to all contract items. All subcontractors must meet the same minimum insurance requirements.
