





A project to improve safety and access for traffic heading northbound into Ohio from Covington, Kentucky, by giving drivers more time to move to their intended lane, started the end of March.

Named because of its beginning and subsequent popularity in the State of Texas, the Texas Turnaround is a travel pattern that helps traffic move more efficiently through busy highway interchange areas.

Once construction is completed, the existing entrance ramp from 4th St. in Downtown Covington to I-71/75 northbound will be permanently closed. Following clearly-marked signage, drivers will access Pike St. by using the existing ramp that carries traffic to I-71/75



southbound, then turn left onto a new ramp, then left again onto I-71/75 northbound. There will be no traffic signals throughout this movement.

Additional project components include: Restriping the travel lanes on I-71/75 northbound to provide an additional travel lane from Pike St. to the Brent Spence Bridge. Reconstructing the bridge that carries traffic from I-71/75 northbound to 5th St. to accommodate the new traffic pattern. Upgrading traffic signals for local traffic at Pike St. Building various safety features, including crosswalks and new sidewalks, for pedestrians in the Pike St. area.

"Currently, a northbound driver who enters I-71/75 northbound from the 4th St. on-ramp in Covington and wants to continue north to I-75 in Ohio has to cross multiple lanes of travel – on the bridge," said Bob Yeager, Chief District Engineer of KYTC's District 6 office. "The new travel pattern will provide more time for drivers to safely change lanes," he continued.

The Kentucky Engineering Exposure Network (KEEN) is doing great things in District 6! KEEN offers fun, interactive activities to get students interested in Engineering. Whether students are counting how many coins the boat they built can hold or building bridges out of spice drops and toothpicks; they're learning about the engineering process. Students are given a basic understanding of the different types of engineers and what jobs they perform. Many respond positively and express their interest directly to our presenters. This year KEEN presenters gave 43 presentations while visiting 16 different schools. That means KEEN has reached over 1000 students this year alone! Out of those 1010 students, 482 were females and 120 were minorities. Inclusivity is an important goal within KEEN.

The obvious problems that arose with the pandemic, mainly the inability to visit schools in person, did not hold the program back. KEEN is proud to say that this school year saw the most presentations since the 2016/2017 school year! KEEN is not only breaking records in presentations done: there's record involvement too. Distracted Driving – Cell Phone Usage

- Distracted driving is a major public health and safety issue and is increased by using cell phones. When you use your phone
- (texting or calling) you are taking your eyes off the road for 5-
- 10 seconds, or essentially driving on the roadway with your eyes closed. Many thrive at multitasking but multitasking behind the wheel is life threating to you and to others.
- Hazards associated with cell phone usage and operating a vehicle:

Cell phone conversations can be more intense and distracting than casual conversations with a passenger. Cell phone users are less likely to react quickly enough to a traffic situation if they are on the phone and not paying attention to the roadway.

Drivers focus on the handheld device to make calls instead of paying attention to the roadway.



KYTC Policy: SHA -1704 - Employees shall not use cell phones or other electronic devices while operating state-owned or state-leased vehicles or equipment.

Employees shall not use cell phones or other electronic devices while working around or in close proximity to vehicles or equipment while they are in use.

Safety Reminder:

If you must make a phone call from your vehicle, pull safely off the road, stop, thén dial.

Find a parking lot, rest stop or normal parking area. Pulling off on the shoulder of the roadway for a phone call puts you in unnecessary danger.
