## Special Scoping Study of Historic Properties in the Proposed Realignment Corridor for KY 30, Jackson and Owsley Counties, Kentucky

#### **ABSTRACT**

Wilbur Smith Associates prepared an overview study of historic properties located in or near the proposed relocation corridor of KY 30 in Jackson and Owsley Counties, Kentucky. The work was conducted under contract to Palmer Engineering, Winchester, KY. The proposed realignments of KY 30 from US 421 at Tyner in Jackson County to KY 11 just west of Booneville in Owsley County for a total project length of about 18 miles.

This overview summarizes available documentation for historic properties currently documented within or near the proposed corridor. These data were compiled from existing Kentucky Heritage Council (KHC) data files, an overview report of Jackson County historic properties (Hudson 1996), and the KHC GIS for Historic Properties. The collection of this kind of information prior to selecting an alignment for the proposed relocation will facilitate the completion of base studies for any future environmental documents that are likely to be needed for the project to proceed, and will reduce the number of resources requiring evaluation.

A Historic Properties survey is recommended for the selected alignment.

# Introduction & Purpose of the Study

This study was requested by the KTC to identify and review existing historic properties records for properties within or near the proposed relocation of KY 30 in Jackson and Owsley Counties, KY (Figure 1). The objective of this study is to identify recorded sites, and discover if any of these represent a potential fatal flaw for one or more alignments under consideration. Most historic properties are documented as part of the Section 106 legislation. In 1996, Hudson prepared an overview of Jackson County Historic Properties (Hudson 1996). Her report provides details on the kinds of historic properties recorded in the county; none of the properties she recorded are within or near the project location.

This first tier study will reduce or eliminate redundant studies necessary for the production of the final environmental document for this project. Because this study is at an overview level, it will only identify and document known historic properties within and adjacent to the project area, and does not serve as a National Register evaluation document. This study is not intended for SHPO compliance and review and does not meet the standards for such documentation.

# Project Justification

The use of Federal funds in highway planning and construction obligates the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet to assess the environmental impact of a proposed transportation improvement. The guiding principals for the assessment of impacts to cultural properties relate to the National Register's standards for evaluating their significance. These standards were developed to recognize the accomplishments of all peoples who have made a significant contribution to our country's history and heritage. The criteria are designed to guide State and local governments, Federal agencies, and others in evaluating potential entries in the National Register.

The quality of significance in American history, architecture, archeology, engineering, and culture is present in districts, sites, buildings, structures, and objects that possess

integrity of location, design, setting, materials, workmanship, feeling, and association, and:

- That are associated with events that have made a significant contribution to the broad patterns of our history; or
- That are associated with the lives of significant persons in our past; or
- C. That embody the distinctive characteristics of a type, period, or method of construction, or that represent the work of a master, or that possess high artistic value, or that represent a significant and distinguishable entity whose components may lack individual distinction; or
- D. That have yielded or may be likely to yield, information important in history or prehistory.

These four criteria are used to assess if a cultural property merits listing in the National Register of Historic Places and often determine what measures can be taken to preserve the resource or mitigate any impact from the Federal undertaking. National transportation policy specified under a USDOT Act of 1966 that special effort should be made to preserve historic sites. Section 4(f) of this act stipulates that the FHWA will not approve any program or project which requires the use of any publicly owned public park, recreation area, or wildlife or waterfowl refuge, or any land from an historic site of national, state, or local significance unless:

- there is no feasible and prudent alternative to the use, and;
- all possible planning to minimize harm resulting from such use is included.

If a cultural property is eligible for listing under Criterion A, B or C, the degree to which any adverse impacts resulting from the Federally funded undertaking can be mitigated are limited and would have to be individually negotiated with the State Historic Preservation Office (in Kentucky, the Kentucky Heritage Council). If a cultural property is eligible for listing under Criterion D, any adverse impact of the Federal undertaking can be mitigated by recovery of the information that is deemed important to history or prehistory. Historic properties are typically considered under Criterion A, B or C, although Criterion D may also



come into play. In sum, any buildings, distinctive or regional landscapes, historic districts, bridges, cemeteries, or roadways, that are older than 50 years of age and in the area of potential effect (APE) should be evaluated by an architectural or landscape historian to assess if they are potentially eligible for nomination to the National Register of Historic Places.

### Project Description

The existing KY 30 corridor is a narrow, two lane, winding roadway through mountainous terrain with little or no shoulder. Due to geometric deficiencies in the roadway such as poor sight distance, vertical and horizontal curves, poor grades and blind entrances, speeds from 15 to 45 mph are required for driving. The proposed project is the reconstruction of KY 30 from US 421 at Tyner in Jackson County to KY 11 just west of Booneville in Owsley County. The study corridor is approximately 1000 ft (0.3 km) on either side of alignment Alternates A, B, and C (see Figure 1.1).

There are several purposes for this project. Primarily, the project would provide better access to the interstate highway system and safer driving conditions along KY 30, which creates an additional benefit in travel time savings for local residents traveling to work, shopping centers, and medical facilities. Truck access to and from local industries would be greatly improved. Finally, the economic development this project would bring to local communities in the project area is very important

#### Research Methods

A visit to the Kentucky Heritage Council was made to obtain copies of records showing the previously recorded historic properties in the project corridor. These records were then imported into the project GIS, so that they could be located with reference to the study region. No fieldwork or detailed archival research was conducted for this project.

#### Issues

Several issues became apparent during the records search and the compilation of data for the project GIS. These issues include the observation that the co-ordinate data for some historic property locations contain co-ordinate errors of unknown magnitude, and that some survey forms are not on file at KHC.

Missing Survey Forms - One issue concerns some Jackson County historic properties documented in Hudson (1996). Although the location of these properties is recorded in the report, along with descriptions, no survey forms are on file at the Kentucky Heritage Council. However, none of these sites appear to be in the project area.

Locational Errors - Discrepancies were noted between the reported location of some sites in the project area on survey forms at KHC and their illustrated location on KHC copies of USGS topographic maps. Errors of between 100 m and 200 m in Northing and Easting locations were evident.

A phone call was made to Mr. Bill McIntire of the Kentucky Heritage Council, to request clarification on this issue. Mr. McIntire indicated that the KHC Historic Properties GIS was under development at the Kentucky Archaeological Survey, (KAS) at the University of Kentucky and that the co-ordinate data could be obtained from this source. Accordingly, for this study, the GIS-generated site locations for all sites in the project region were obtained from Mr. Philip Mink of the University of Kentucky, constitute the historic property locations used throughout the present report (see Appendix A). It should be noted that until a field check is conducted, the correct locations for some historic properties is unknown. Table 1.1 illustrates the data sources used in this study.

#### Results

Research at the KHC and the collation of GIS locational information obtained from the KAS indicates that there are 57 historic properties recorded in and near the project area, although without a field check it is impossible to say if this number are still extant. Figure 1.1 shows the location of these properties, and Appendix A lists them by Survey #. Table 1.2 summarizes the pertinent information for these properties. Appendix B includes copies of the original survey forms for some of these properties. Of the 57 historic properties, 21 are located in downtown Booneville and will not be affected, thus information was not gathered for these properties.

#### Discussion

Of the 57 historic properties, 21 (OwB 1-21) are located in Booneville, and were not further researched for this study. Of the remaining properties, one is recorded twice (Ow2 and Ow3, the Ross Levi House). A total of 22 historic properties are residences with dates of construction beginning in the mid 19<sup>th</sup> century, and continuing into the 20<sup>th</sup> century. No properties dating from before 1840 are recorded.

In addition to the 22 historic residences, there is 1 store/commercial building, 4 schools/churches, 1 other (bridges, road, etc.), and 8 historic properties of unidentified or unknown function.

For the properties recorded in the study region, no information is available on their National Register status. Further, as no field research was conducted, it is not known how many of these recorded properties have been demolished, or altered to the point that they would no longer be considered eligible for nomination to the National Register of Historic Places.

#### Conclusions

Historic properties are documented within and near the project study area. Research has identified that (1) some forms for historic properties are not on record at KHC; and (2) some errors occur in the reported location of historic properties in Jackson County.

#### Recommendations

The project area should be visited to identify the correct location of historic properties that are likely to be effected by the proposed undertaking, before a final alignment is selected. This work could be conducted in conjunction with a Historic Structures Survey, which is likely to be required by the KHC for the selected alignment.

### Summary

Records search conducted at the KHC identified 57 recorded sites in the project region. Twenty-one properties are located in downtown Booneville, and were not further researched. Missing forms, and errors in reporting were noted. GIS generated co-ordinates from the Kentucky Archaeological Survey were used in this report rather than KCH survey form data. As the project area has not been systematically surveyed for historic structures and is likely to require such a study before final approval for a selected alignment, a comprehensive survey of historic cultural properties should be conducted.



# Statement of Significance:

The property is located on the northeast corner of the US 421 S. / HWY 1431 intersection in the Jackson County community of Tyner. The two-story, pre-World War II commercial building, known as the Riley Shepard Garage, was built as a privately owned and operated automotive garage/service station (first story) and a residence (second story) in the early 1930s. Currently, the building is used as a residence. The building is one of two historic commercial structures and two historic residences located at this intersection in Tyner. These resources together form an intact example of a small crossroads community formed of residences and commercial buildings dating from the late nineteenth through the early twentieth century located in the appalachian foothills region of Kentucky. This commercial/residential building is typical of the once quite common practice of an owner/operator living above the business. Today, it survives as a rare example of the form. Together, the four buildings and the surrounding area convey the physical and associative qualities of integrity that make them eligible to the National Register as an historic district with significance under criteria a on a local level for the period of circa 1890 through 1945.


### Description:

A two-story commercial building located on the northeast side of US 421 South, initially built as a service station (first story) and residence (second story) in the 1930s. The building is of sawn frame with pressed tin siding in a rusticated block finish, has a shed roof with exposed rafter ends, covered with standing seam metal. The front (southwest) facade is divided into four bays

including a central single-bay garage with track-hung vertical board doors. Two entries are 1/2 light; windows are paired and single 2/2 sash with plain wood surrounds and sills. A mortared, rusticated sandstone basement has a southeast side entry and 2/2 sash windows. The second story is currently used for storage and the first contains living space in a "U" configuration, surrounding the central auto bay which is partitioned off from the living space. The property was surveyed by Karen Hudson in 1992.

Statement of Significance:

The historic Tyner Grocery is located on the southwest side of US 421, across from the HWY 1431 intersection and is a two-story, frame commercial building built in the early 1930s. The Spurlock family had the building constructed as a first story general store and a second story apartment, with the family residing upstairs until they built a separate residence circa 1940 (see JA 295 following). Although currently vacant, the building maintains very good physical integrity. The building is one of two historic commercial structures and two historic residences located at this intersection in Tyner. These resources together form an intact example of a small crossroads community formed of residences and commercial buildings dating from the late nineteenth through the early twentieth century located in the Appalachian foothills region of Kentucky. This commercial/residential building is typical of the once fairly common practice of an owner/operator living above the business. Today, it survives as a rare example of the form. Together, the four buildings and the surrounding area convey the physical and associative qualities of integrity that make them eligible to the National Register as an historic district with significance under criteria a on a local level for the period of circa 1890 through 1945.


### Description:

A two-story, frame, commercial building, historically known as both the Tyner Grocery and Spurlock's Grocery. The building has weatherboard siding, standing seam metal covered shed roof with exposed rafter ends, and a pier foundation covered with metal skirting pressed with a

rusticated concrete block pattern. The front (northeast) facade, is divided into four bays including paired glass and wood entry doors to the store area flanked by 1/1 sash windows and reached via a uncovered stoop on a pier foundation with similar metal skirting. A five-panel entry door to the left front gave access to a small room partitioned for an individual function. This room once contained the Tyner Post Office. Windows are 1/1 sash with plain wood surrounds. The interior also exhibits good integrity with original wood floors and perimeter shelving. The property was surveyed by Karen Hudson in 1992.



### Statement of Significance:

The Laura Williams house, located on the east side of US 421 South, near the HWY 1431 intersection in the community of Tyner in Jackson County, Kentucky, is a good example of the early twentieth century bungalow form distinguished as a structural example of random coursed, rusticated sandstone masonry. The property appears to be individually eligible to the National Register under Criteria C on a local level, as a fine example of bungalow architecture and sandstone masonry practice in Jackson County.

### Description:

Sitting on a west facing slope in the small community of Tyner, the property is a 1-1/2 story, sandstone masonry bungalow of uncoursed, ashlar blocks, asphalt shingled side gable roof central front shed dormer, knee brackets, exposed rafter ends and a central interior brick chimney. The front (west) facade is divided into three bays (window - door - window) with paired, 3/1 sash windows flanking the central entry and has a 3/4 porch with battered wood posts on concrete capped stone piers. Additional features include a continuous sandstone foundation and a one-story, single bay room extending from the north wall. The house is surrounded by farm acreage and features no additions or major alterations on the exterior facades. The property was surveyed by Karen Hudson in 1992.




#### Description:

The property is a small rural residential complex in the northeast corner of the intersection of KY 1431 and KY 421 containing a late 19th century frame residence, sandstone warmhouse and frame garage. The residence is a two-story, frame, center passage, single pile I-House with two-story rear ell. The gable roof is clad with standing seam metal covering, has historic, colored glass lightning rods at the gable ends, two interior brick chimneys, and diamond shaped ventilators in the gable ends. The front, three bay facade (southeast) has a full-length shed porch on turned wood supports. The central entry is flanked by 2/2 sash windows with wood sills and surrounds and decorative gabled hood moldings. The rear ell has a full shed porch along the southwest wall and an enclosed shed addition with Masonite siding on the northeast wall. The foundation is covered with metal skirting.

A warmhouse is located northeast of the main residence; a one-story storage structure of smooth cut ashlar sandstone construction. The front gable roof is covered with standing seam metal and has board and batten gable ends. The warmhouse is built into a slope, with an entry of vertical boards facing southwest toward the main residence.

A garage is located southeast of the main residence; a pre-World War II box frame building with one central bay. Covered with vertical board siding, the building is oriented east-west with the front gable roof clad with standing seam metal. Double swinging doors access the garage bay.

### Statement of Significance:

The historic resources of this property: a frame residence and sandstone/frame warmhouse were constructed around 1940 for the Spurlock family, owner/operators of the Tyner grocery store, to the immediate northwest on 421. The Spurlock's lived in the upstairs apartment of the store until this house was built. The house and warmhouse are good examples of early twentieth century residential architecture throughout Kentucky and is significant for its association with the Spurlock's store at the intersection. The property maintains good physical integrity and is one of two historic residences and two historic commercial structures located at this intersection in Tyner. These resources together form an intact example of a small crossroads community of residences and commercial buildings dating from the late nineteenth through the early twentieth century. Together, these resources and the surrounding area convey the physical and associative qualities of integrity that make them eligible to the National Register as an historic district with significance under criteria a on a local level for the period of circa 1890 through 1945.


### Description:

The property overlooks the community of Tyner from a hillside at the southwest corner of the intersection of KY 421 and 1431, and contains a main residence, warmhouse and garage. The residence is a 1-1/2 story, frame, bungalow styled building with a coursed, rusticated ashlar sandstone foundation, weatherboard siding and an asphalt shingled side gable roof with front and rear central shed dormers. The front (northeast) facade features three bays of paired 3/1

sash windows flanking a 1/2 light entry door, a 3/4 length shed porch with battered, square wood posts on a raised sandstone foundation with stone steps. Other windows are paired 6/6 and 3/1 sash, with plain wood surrounds and shutters. Two shed additions, one full-length across the rear and a one-bay rectangular side addition, have weatherboard siding. There is one interior brick chimney. A warmhouse is located behind the main residence in the yard area; a two-story, single bay warmhouse (local vernacular) with sandstone first floor built into a slope and weatherboard clad upper frame portion. The root cellar is flanked by a stepped ashlar stone wall. A vertical board entry faces the main residence. The upper, frame dry-storage bay has a front gable roof with standing seam metal and a board entry door beneath the gable end. A garage, built after World War II and located northwest of the main residence at the base of the driveway is a one-bay, front gable, concrete block building with standing seam metal roof.

Creek Independent Grade School. Labor and materials were donated by locals.

By 1921, the school was known as Clifty Academy. The same year, financial responsibility was assumed by the Barbourville District of the Methodist Conference. During the period of the '20s, the school combined grade school with high school. (In 1922 was the first graduating class of the Clifty Community High School.)

Later, the Methodist Conference decided to move the high school to Booneville. In 1930 the property was purchased by the County Board of Education. The first 8 grades continued to be taught at Clifty until 1952 when all county schools were consolidated. The community was never to be the same. Wrote Joyce Wilson, "Loosing the high school tolled the death knell for the once thriving Scoville community" (Wilson, p. 57).








Figure 2. Portion of the Sturgeon (USGS 1953) Quadrangle illustrating the Permit Area. (1" = 2000')




Figure 2. Sturgeon 7.5' topographic map (photorevised 1976) showing the location of the proposed permit area and site 150w112. The scale is one inch equals 2000 feet.


Description: This turn-of-the-century historic farmstead is situated near the junction of an unnamed hollow and Sturgeon Creek on a gently undulating ridge (Figures 4). The site consists of an abandoned, one story structure (Figure 5) and several standing or partially collapsed outbuildings. In addition, a six bent tobacco barn (Figure 6), shown on the 1953 Sturgeon topographic map, is located on the proposed permit area that is very probably associated with this farmstead. A dirt farm road leading to a house in this location also is depicted the 1953 Sturegon topographic map. No earlier topographic maps of this area are available. The house and barn are not shown on either the Owsley County 1927 Kentucky Geological Survey map or the 1937 Highway and Transportation map.

Areas located to the front, side, and rear of the main residence were severely disturbed by erosion caused by the dirt farm road and previous bulldozer activity in the yard. Examination of the inside of the main residence revealed the floorplan depicted in Figure 7. Portions of the structure which were not covered with composition siding were constructed utilizing vertical wood planks and common wire nails. The foundation is constructed of cinder block mortared with concrete. The central part of the house contains a double-sided, cut sandstone chimney, which contained fireboxes had been modified for coal burning.

Informant information obtained from Helen Wright of the town of Travelers Rest (telephone number (502/287-8232), a daughter-in-law of Ray Wilson the former owner and resident, suggests that the house had been extensively modified during the 1930's. Artifacts observed inside and outside the main residence consisted of decalcomania and plain whitewares, fragments of undiagonistic stoneware, clear container glass, and miscellaneous modern clothing items and tablewares. These items suggest a fairly recent occupation of the site and appear to support information provided by Ms.Wright who related that the site was abandoned during the 1950's. Shovel probes were not excavated in the yard, since most portions were disturbed by bulldozing. The disturbance extended well into the clay subsoil, thus severely compromising site integrity. No features were observed in this area. As previously mentioned, several outbuildings were situated in the vicinity of the main residence which are shown in Figure 6. With the exception of a cinder block structure situated near the road, which was possibly used as a cold storage or a milk cellar, the function of the remaining outbuildings could not be determined.

Archival research to aid in assessing the earliest occupation of the farmstead was not attempted since extensive structural modifications and bulldozer activity had severely compromised site integrity.

- 13. The school was moved across the road circa 1930 when the road was built. Jim Flannery and Bob Hale put the structure on skids and pulled it across by oxen according to the present owner. Keith Gabbard. The school was discontinued at an unknown date and the building became a rural store. When it was relocated, the front became the back of the building and double doors were added to gain entrance into the store from the new road. The shed addition was added for storage by the store owner.
- 14. The framed building sits on a sawn log sill which appears to have been taken from an earlier log structure because of oddly placed tendons along the parimeter. The windows are 6/6. The store was entered by double board and batten doors which are in place. The former front wooden doors, now located on the rear of the building are original. The unpainted building has traces of original red paint still visable around the door frames.

The east elevation boxed shed addition is 7 X 24 with boxed eaves, tin shed roof, and board and batten door.
