

National Work Zone Awareness Week is an initiative to increase roadway safety in and around work zones. Together, we can build a safety culture every day to prevent serious injuries and fatalities, regardless of where we work .

This safety talk is focused on safety for those driving through and working in work zones.

It's Dangerous Out There— Some work zone crash numbers for Kentucky last year alone—
▶ 1,251 crashes ▶ 42% of crashes involved distracted driving ▶ 25% had speeding as a factor
247 injuries > 17 fatalities—14 driver/passengers, 2 workers, 1 pedestrian

As drivers—especially when operating state vehicles—we play a major part in the safety of everyone in roadway work zones, including workers, other motorists, and ourself.

Why are work zones a concern?

- Potential for changed traffic flow patterns, so even motorists who frequently pass through may encounter new challenges.
- Lane width restrictions or choke points
- Uncertainty in interpreting warning or directional signs, especially near interchanges and intersections under work.
- Distraction by the work, "rubbernecking"—people love to look at what is going on behind the cones or barrier wall-while ignoring what is in front of them.
- Speed reductions only observed by some can cause sudden and drastic speed differentials and accompanying sudden lane changing.
- Drivers are more distracted, more aggressive, less considerate, and seemingly more careless every day toward workers on roadway, pedestrians, and other motorists.

What should everyone do?

Report Near-Miss incidents so we can learn and prevent them in the future.

How can the KYTC team help?

- Understand and remember—YOU and your attitude are the most important factor in your personal safety and effectiveness as a driver.
- Remember that you are setting an example for someone with your driving behavior-either good or bad.
- When driving a state vehicle—other drivers are looking at YOU and expect you to "walk the talk"
- Safety check, repair, maintain equipment and vehicles as if your life depends on it.
- \blacksquare Phone down, eyes up, focus on driving at all times but especially in work zones.
- Watch for others that are distracted or possibly confused by altered traffic flow or speed varitions in work zones.
