Enclosed, please find the approved CE Level 1 document for the above subject project. Impacts as a result of the above project include: (1) removing 1.76 acres of marginal Indiana bat summer habitat within a maternity home range; (2) taking of ROW from two NRHP eligible sites and obtaining deminimis 4(f) approval; and (3) minimal ROW will be acquired along with temporary easements for construction with no total takes anticipated. One potential impact to waters of the US will occur by culvert replacement to one unnamed intermittent blueline stream near Hayfield Way.

Items that need to be placed in the CAP include: (1) Coordination with USFWS prior to construction for impacting 1.76 acres of IB summer habitat, (2) Completion of archaeological phase I work at parcels 15, 20, and 21 after ROE or fee simple purchase, and (3) Potential for Corps of Engineers permit at culvert crossing near Hayfield Way.














Oldham County Traffic Forecast US 42 from County Line to Ridgemoor Drive Project Number: 5-441.00

Amid feud, city hires party firm

For the first time in at least 12 years, the Louisville East-Middletown Chamber of Commerce will not run Middletown's annual Milestone Festival. partly because of an apparent feud between a city commissioner and the group's president.

Last week the city contracted with a private event-planning firm, Eventualities, to run the September festival, which in-

cludes food and arts vendors, a parade, a dog show, children's activities and live music.

"It's a slap in the face," said Middletown Chamber President Judy Francis.

Francis criticized the city for agreeing to pay Eventualities \$60,000 to run the festival. She noted that the city spent only about \$40,000 on the festival the last two years under the chamber's management.

A new set of city specifications made it "impossible" for the chamber to bid on or produce the festival, Francis said.

The city's new rules call for the festival to be Sept. 12-13. It previously has been held the weekend after Labor Day, but Mayor J. Byron Chapman said he wanted to move it farther from the holiday, when some families take vacations, and closer to the Sept. 16-21 Ryder Cup festivities.

Thank you for your letter dated December 9, 2009 regarding the referenced project and its potential effect on the Wallace Farm, a property to which River Fields holds a conservation easement. Your letter indicated that the removal of a tree line adjacent to the existing road edge should be subject to a "thorough review through a Section 106 process" as the SHPO has indicated that the property is eligible for the National Register of Historic Places.

The subject project has advanced in a manner consistent with the Section 106 process. This property was determined potentially eligible by KYTC, a finding concurred upon by the SHPO by letters dated May 21, 2009 and July 2, 2009 (see attached). Within those same letters, the SHPO also concurred with the finding that Alternative 1 does not constitute an adverse effect to the property or, in the case of Site 11(Kinchloe/Embry/ Grafton House) No Effect. The May 21, 2009 letter was the result of SHPO review of the KYTC cultural historic survey conducted by H. Powell and Company in which the removal of the vegetation and trees bordering the roadside edge were clearly identified as a project impact. SHPO concluded that these activities did not "impact the property in a way that will substantially diminish its ability to convey its significance nor will it severely detract from the characteristics which make it eligible for listing."

As was suggested in your letter, consultation on eligibility and effects required under Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act has been conducted. We appreciate your interest in the project and consider consultation on the matter to have been appropriately completed as you suggested.

This is in response to your letter dated July 24, 2009 to David French requesting River Fields comments, as a Consulting Party, on the proposed US 42 Widening project.

As noted in our previous correspondence on May 20, 2009 to David Waldner, Division of Environmental Analysis, Kentucky Transportation Cabinet, our interest in this project relates to the fact that River Fields, Inc. holds two conservation easements on 591.490 acres of the Wallace Farm located in Jefferson and Oldham Counties. A portion of that farm and our easement borders the proposed widening project and we believe the conservation easement would be adversely affected by construction of the proposed project as it is presently designed.

• The temporary easement proposed along the north-west edge of US 42 will require the destruction of significant tree mass. This tree line as it presently exists provides a visual and to some extent sound barrier between the traffic flow along US 42 and the farm. It is noted that a small shift in roadway alignment to the south-east would eliminate the need for this taking. It would appear from inspection of the drawings, that such a shift would have only minimal impact on properties located along the south-eastern edge of US 42 and would preserve this important aesthetic and environmental buffer along this section of US 42.

• It is further noted that in a recent letter dated October 30, 2009 from the State Historic Preservation Officer (SHPO) to Carla Wallace that he believes pursuing a National Register listing for the entire farm is a viable and worthwhile option for the Wallace family. This means the SHPO believes the property is potentially eligible for the National Register. We are of the opinion that the widening of US 42 and destruction of vegetation along this important buffer, as presently planned, would require a thorough review through a Section 106 process as the property is potentially eligible. A copy of the SHPO's letter is enclosed for your further information.

On October 9, 2008, I had the opportunity to meet with David French, Meme Runyon and you to discuss the potential for a National Register listing for your family's farm in Prospect. After our meeting, I toured many areas of the farm with Ms. Runyon and looked at most of the buildings that might contribute to a listing.

In viewing the physical condition of the property, and in considering the history of the farm, my opinion is that pursuing a National Register listing is a viable, and I hope you agree, a worthwhile option.

My recommendation is that you consider the preparation of an application for listing. This can be done by you or representatives for your family. Because of the complexity of listing a large property with multiple resources, the approach most commonly taken would be to hire a consultant with expertise in the research and writing that would identify the important aspects of the property and create a strong argument for significance.



The State Historic Preservation Office received, on May 11, 2009, your letter regarding the above-referenced project as well as a letter dated April 15, 2009 from KYTC-DEA. This office originally commented on this undertaking in a letter dated February 12, 2009 in which we determined that Sites 1, 2, 3 and 9 (OL-503, OL-504, OL-505 and OL-511) were eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places (NRHP). This office also requested that an additional site be documented, resulting in the consultant's identification of Site 11, the Kinchloe/Embry/Grafton House (JF-1836). While we were not asked to make a determination of eligibility for this property, we have been contacted by River Fields, Inc., a non-profit organization interested in becoming a consulting party on this project, who suggest that JF-1836 is associated with individuals of substantial regional significance. Within the historic context of this report, the consultant identified a twentieth-century trend when "...significant citizens of Louisville during the era [1920s] were attracted to the agrarian lifestyle in Oldham County (IV-6)." These individuals are said to have frequently adapted existing Oldham County farmland to suit bloodstock operations. Since the Embry brothers were natives of Louisville and leaders in regional Agriculture, owning their own livestock company and acting as President of Stockyard Associations in multiple states, we believe that this property could be eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places under Criteria B for its associations with these individuals and as a reflection of the aforementioned, notable trend.

A letter from your office, dated May 7, 2009, indicates that Alternative 1 – Minimization will result in minor taking from the National Register boundaries of Sites 1, 2, 3, and 9, Alternative 2 will have an Adverse Effect on these sites, and Alternative 3 is no longer being considered. Alternative 1 – Minimization will take 0.003 acres of permanent right of way from Site 9 and will include the construction of a retention wall along a portion of the property facing Highway 42. Alternative 1 also requires a taking of approximately six to seven feet of land from Sites 1, 2, and 3 along the roadway. Therefore, we concur with your office that this taking will not

impact the property in a way that will substantially diminish its ability to convey its significance nor will it severely detract from the characteristics which make it eligible for listing. Therefore, we concur that this undertaking will have No Adverse Effect upon these historic properties and agree with your recommendation that the De Minimis rule be applied to Sites 1, 2, 3, and 9.

In closing, we would like to point out that while this taking is considered to be minor from a historic/cultural resource perspective, River Fields Inc. has indicated that they hold a conservation easement on these properties. We acknowledge that information pertaining to the enforcement of this conservation easement could weigh differently on the review of alternatives selected by this undertaking. Should any additional information change or impact the scope of work for the project or its alternatives, please contact our office so that we may determine if additional documentation is needed.

Attached please find one copy of the above subject report, the State Historic Preservation Office's (SHPO) response dated February 12, 2009, and a copy of additional information provided by Helen Powell, the report's author. The report recommends a finding of No Effect, hence the reason it was not originally reviewed by your office. The SHPO disagreed with the Determinations of Eligibility and Effect for Sites 1, 2, 3, and 9 and questioned the omitting of the Grafton House, which lies at the southwest edge of the APE in Jefferson County. Helen Powell has completed a survey form and provided additional research for the Grafton House. Based on the additional information we do not believe the site is eligible for the National Register under Criteria A, B, or C. The house was built in 1929 and is a mix of architectural styles, utilizing elements of the Arts and Crafts and Colonial Revival movements and appears to have been built in different construction phases. Important individuals inhabited the house, but their importance does not appear to be transcendent in Louisville or Jefferson County or beyond. Regardless, the project will have No Effect on the Grafton House and no construction will occur in its immediate vicinity. Qk4, the design consultant, has developed Alternative 1- Minimization to avoid an Adverse Effect to Site 9, a Colonial Revival fruit stand. The minimization will have No Adverse Effect on Site 9 and will require 0.003 acres of permanent right-of-way. Alternative 2 will have an Adverse Effect to Site 9. The SHPO believes Sites 1, 2, and 3 qualify as a historic agricultural district. These sites comprise part of an area under an existing conservation easement held by River Fields. Alternative 1 will have No Adverse Effect on Sites 1, 2, and 3 and Alternative 2 will have an Adverse Effect. Alternative 3 is no longer under consideration. We ask for your office to review the Determinations of Eligibility and Effects and forward this information, along with the attached survey form, to the State Historic Preservation Office upon completion of your review.

The State Historic Preservation Office has received for review and comment the above-referenced cultural historic survey competed by Helen Powell with H. Powell and Company, Inc. The proposed undertaking involves the widening of US 42 to add a continuous left-turn lane. There are three alternates for the project. The author identified 10 historic resources within the project Area of Potential Effect and concluded that none were eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places.

We agree with the author and KYTC-DEA that Site 4 (OL-506), Site 5 (OL-507), Site 6 (OL-508), Site 7 (OL-509), Site 8 (OL-510) and Site 10 (OL-295) do not appear to be eligible for listing in the NRHP.

We do not agree with the author's evaluation of Site 1 (OL-503), Site 2 (OL-504), Site 3 (OL-505) and Site 9(OL-511). On October 9, 2008, Mark Dennen, Acting Executive Director and SHPO, visited the Wallace Farm and determined that it is eligible for listing as a historic vernacular landscape or rural historic district under Criteria A and B, with Sites 1-3 included as contributing resources. This office has been contacted by the property owners regarding the development of a NRHP nomination.

Additionally, it is the opinion of this office that Site 9 (OL-511), the Belknap Fruit Stand, is eligible for listing in the NRHP under Criterion B, for its association with William Belknap and the agricultural activities of the Belknap Farm and, and under Criterion C, as an example of a designed Colonial Revival roadside resource in Oldham County.

Furthermore, we have some questions about the APE and the exclusion of possible historic resources within this report. Historic topographical maps show a dwelling within the Jefferson County portion of the APE, to the north of US 42. The Grafton House is located at 10801 West Highway 42 and was built in the 1920s. We would appreciate clarification on why this resource was not included in this survey.

WHEREAS, the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) has determined that the reconstruction of US-42 from the Oldham/Jefferson County line to Ridgemoor Drive in Oldham County is a federal undertaking subject to Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966 as amended; and

WHEREAS, River Fields Inc. (River Fields) holds a 1200 linear foot conservation easement along the northern frontage of US 42 within the project area and identified as Parcels #15, 20, and 21 on the project Plans; and

WHEREAS, a Phase I intensive archaeological survey was conducted of the entire project 0.9 mile project area with the exception of that within the conservation easement and found no archaeological sites; and

WHEREAS, River Fields and the Wallace Family Heirs denied access for an archaeological investigation to that portion of the project area held by River Fields in a conservation area; and

WHEREAS, FHWA and the State Historic Preservation Officer (SHPO) have agreed to defer archaeological investigation of this portion of the project area until access is obtained; and

WHEREAS, The Kentucky Transportation Cabinet (KYTC) participated in the consultation and has been invited to concur in the Memorandum of Agreement;

NOW, THEREFORE, the FHWA, the SHPO, and KYTC agree that the undertaking shall be implemented in accordance with the following stipulations in order to take into account the effect of the undertaking on historic properties.

Stipulations

FHWA will ensure that the following measures are carried out.

1. FHWA shall ensure that all archaeological work required by this Memorandum of Agreement will be carried out by Preservation Professionals meeting at a minimum the Secretary of the Interior's Professional Qualification Standards (48 FR 44738-9).

- 2. FHWA will consult with the Kentucky SHPO for concurrence that the Preservation Professionals meet these Standards.
- 3. KYTC will conduct, or cause to be conducted, an archaeological survey of the subject property, located along the northern frontage of US 42 within the project area and identified as Parcels #15, 20, and 21 on the project Plans to determine if it contains archaeological sites that are eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places (NRHP). A report documenting the results of this investigation will be prepared in accordance with the Kentucky Heritage Council's (KHC) most current Specifications for Archaeological Field Work and Assessment Reports (Specifications) and will be submitted by FHWA to the SHPO for review and comment.
- 4. If prehistoric sites are identified, the report will be submitted to relevant federally recognized Indian Tribes for comment.
- 5. If archaeological sites are identified and considered potentially eligible by the SHPO for listing in the NRHP, they will be tested prior to the initiation of any construction activities to determine if they are eligible for listing in the NRHP. Upon completion of the testing, a report will be prepared in accordance with the KHC's most current Specifications and will be submitted by FHWA to the SHPO and interested federally recognized Indian Tribes for review and comment.
- 6. If, based on the testing, this site is determined by the SHPO to be eligible for listing in the NRHP, FHWA will develop a data recovery plan in conformance with the Secretary of the Interior's Standards for Archaeology and Historic Preservation (48 FR 44716-42) and the KHC's most current Specifications. The data recovery plan will be submitted to the SHPO for review and comment. Unless the SHPO comments or objects within thirty (30) days of receiving the data recovery plan, FHWA shall ensure that the plan is implemented.
- 7. Following implementation of the data recovery fieldwork, a report conforming to Secretary's Standards and Guidelines and SHPO's Specifications shall be submitted to FHWA, KYTC, and SHPO for review and approval.

Modification, Amendment, or Termination

Modification, amendment, or termination of this agreement as necessary shall be accomplished in writing through mutual consent of the signatories in the same manner as the original agreement.

Dispute Resolution

Disputes regarding the completion of the terms of this agreement shall be resolved by the signatories. If the signatories cannot agree regarding a dispute, any one of the

signatories may request the participation of the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation to assist in resolving the dispute.

Duration

I am requesting your concurrence to allow KYTC to defer an archaeological survey (Phase I) on approximately 1200 linear feet across several parcels within the above-referenced project area until after right-of-way (ROW) has been obtained. We have surveyed the rest of the 0.9 mile project corridor, but access to this area has been denied.

This road widening project will affect existing and new ROW along its 0.9 mile corridor. New ROW will generally be located within 20-30 feet on either side of the existing ROW. Typically, we prefer to complete all archaeological surveys prior to proceeding with the project. However, in this case, we feel a delay in surveying the so-called "Wallace" parcels is necessary until after the ROW has been obtained.

Henry F. Wallace, owner of a 600 acre farm in Prospect, Kentucky, died in 2000. Wallace's heirs developed a conservation easement with River Fields, Inc., a local river advocacy organization, for the entire farm. Approximately 1200 linear feet of this property lies along the north side of U.S. 42 within the project corridor in parcels 15, 20, and 21. In 2008, KYTC requested permission from both the Wallace Family heirs and from River Fields to access the property to conduct an archaeological survey, but was denied.

The reasons supporting our position are outlined below.

1. The project area encompasses a 0.9 mile corridor along US 42. A Phase I archaeological survey has been conducted on all other portions of the corridor and no archaeological resources were identified. A "no-find" report was provided to the State Historic Preservation Officer (SHPO). The SHPO concurred with the findings of that report in a letter dated September 11, 2009 with the understanding

that an MOA would be executed ensuring that a Phase I survey will be conducted on the remaining parcels once access is secured.

- 2. It is unlikely that significant historic archaeological resources are present within this corridor, since it is along the front of the property. In her 2008 survey of standing structures in the vicinity of this project, Helen C. Powell did not document any eligible properties within the cultural historic Area of Potential Effect (APE). Three properties were documented on the parcels of interest (Site 1, the Wilhoyte House; Site 2, the Ranch House; and Site 3, the Sallie M. Smith House) and none were determined to be eligible for inclusion in the National Register of Historic Places. It is unlikely that any significant archaeological deposits related to these properties are located along the U.S. 42 frontage on these parcels.
- 3. It is unlikely that the relevant portion of the Wallace parcel contains intact human remains. There are no known burials in the project area in similar landforms in the region. Additionally, the parcel is located in an upland setting, not known in this area to contain prehistoric burials. There is similarly no reason to anticipate historic burials would be found in this area.
- 4. Members of DEA's staff have been attempting to secure permission to conduct an archaeological survey on this property since at least March 2008. We have communicated with Ms. Carla F. Wallace - KYTC's point of contact with the Wallace Family heirs - numerous times via email and through phone conversations and we have sent a letter describing the Phase I survey methods for her to share with the other landowners. We have also worked with several staff members at River Fields to obtain permission, all to no avail. In October 2008, Ms. Wallace indicated to Mr. James Hixon, an archaeologist on DEA staff, that she would deny our request to access the property to conduct an archaeological survey. She said the property is owned by six people and that they would all have to agree to any work. This decision apparently was made following a meeting between the Wallace family and River Fields that was tentatively slated for September 2008, during which this project was an agenda item. KYTC believes that it has made a good faith effort for over a year to request access to these parcels, to explain the intent and the methods of an archaeological survey, and to attempt to satisfy Ms. Wallace's and River Fields' questions regarding the impacts to these properties. Further attempts to obtain access are not likely to be fruitful.
- 5. Deferring the Phase I survey on the Wallace parcel will allow the project to move forward, since the rest of the project area has been investigated and no significant archaeological resources have been identified. Construction within this parcel may not occur until the survey has been conducted and appropriately reviewed, but this small parcel should not significantly delay work elsewhere within the project.

I have attached a map and an aerial photo showing the project area and have highlighted in yellow the area for which I am requesting deferral.

A draft MOA capturing our commitment to survey the remaining portion of the project area is attached. An earlier version of this draft was circulated for comment to Anthony Goodman and Greg Rawlings of the Kentucky office of FHWA. Following a period for comments, Ms. Kary Stackelbeck of the SHPO's office was afforded an opportunity to provide informal comments. She was satisfied with the MOA as-is.

I hope that you will agree that this is an appropriate situation in which to defer archaeological survey of a small portion of a project area until access to the property can be obtained and will assist KYTC in processing the MOA quickly.



This email is being sent to you as a request for consultation on the PM2.5 hotspot determination for Jefferson/Oldham County SYP # 5-441.00 to reconstruct US 42 by adding a center turn lane. This project is in the KIPDA TIP and Plan.

Project: SYP # 5-441.00 --- Reconstruct US 42 by adding a center turn lane to improve safety and traffic flow.

Description: This reconstruction is to reduce crashes and improve traffic flow on US 42 by adding a center turn lane from just south of the Jefferson/Oldham County Line to Ridgemoor Drive. This project is approximately 1 mile long.

Comment: The purpose of this project is to improve the operational flow and safety (site distance improvements) of this highly traveled section of US 42 by adding a center turn lane from just south of the Jefferson/Oldham County line to Ridgemoor Drive. The worse case location is the US 42/Ridgemoor drive intersection. Currently (2008), at the US 42/Ridgemoor Drive intersection (worse case location) traffic has 23,608 AADT and 4.8% (1,141) trucks. In 2012 (open-to-traffic date) at the US 42/Ridgemoor Drive intersection (worse case location) traffic will have 26,130 AADT and 5.8% (1,522) trucks. This project will not alter the forecasted traffic or truck levels. Current and worst case year AADT and # trucks are below volumes that would be of concern.

1.0 Qualitative Analysis

KYTC Item # 5-441.00 in Oldham County, Kentucky involves the addition of a center turn lane on US 42 from the Jefferson/Oldham County line north to Ridgemoor Drive or 0.97 miles. Based on the Build design year (2032) traffic forecasts (AADT 39,200), the addition of a center turn lane on US 42 is a project with low potential MSAT effects as defined by the February 3, 2006 FHWA Interim Guidance on Air Toxics Analysis in NEPA documents. For the Selected Alternative identified in the CE Level 1, the amount of MSATs emitted would be proportional to the vehicle miles traveled (VMT), assuming that other variables such as fleet mix are the same for each alternative that was assessed. The VMT estimated for the Selected Alternative is slightly higher than that for the No Build Alternative, because the additional capacity increases the efficiency of the roadway and attracts rerouted trips from elsewhere in the transportation network. This increase in VMT would lead to higher MSAT emissions for the action alternative along the highway corridor, along with a corresponding decrease in MSAT emissions along the parallel routes. The emissions increase is offset somewhat by lower MSAT emission rates due to increased speeds; according to EPA's MOBILE6 emissions model, emissions of all of the priority MSATs except for diesel particulate matter decrease as speed increases. The extent to which these speed-related emissions decreases will offset VMT-related emissions increases cannot be reliably projected due to the inherent deficiencies of technical models.

Because the estimated VMT under the Build Alternative assessed in the CE Level 1 were nearly the same, varying by less than one percent, it is expected that there would be no appreciable difference in overall MSAT emissions among the various alternatives. Also, for the Selected Alternative, emissions would likely be lower than present levels in the design year as a result of EPA's national control programs that are projected to reduce MSAT emissions by 57 to 87 percent between 2000 and 2020. Local conditions may differ from these national projections in terms of fleet mix and turnover, VMT growth rates, and local control measures. However, the magnitude of the EPA projected reductions is so great (even after accounting for VMT growth) that MSAT emissions in the study area are likely to be lower in the future in nearly all cases.

The center turn lane contemplated as part of this project will have the effect of moving some traffic closer to nearby homes, schools and businesses; therefore, for the Selected Alternative, there may be localized areas where ambient concentrations of MSATs could be higher than the No Build Alternative. However, as discussed above, the magnitude and the duration of these potential increases compared to the No-build alternative cannot be accurately quantified due to the inherent deficiencies of current models. In sum, when a highway is constructed, and, as a result, moves closer to receptors, the localized level of MSAT emissions for the Selected Alternative could be higher relative to the No Build Alternative, but this could be offset due to increases in speeds and reductions in congestion (which are associated with lower MSAT emissions). Also, MSATs will be lower in other locations when traffic shifts away from them. However, on a regional basis, EPA's vehicle and fuel regulations, coupled with fleet turnover, will over time cause substantial reductions that, in almost all cases, will cause region-wide MSAT levels to be significantly lower than today.

2.0 Uncertainty Analysis

Air toxics analysis is an emerging field and current scientific techniques, tools, and data are not sufficient to accurately estimate human health impacts that would result from a transportation project in a way that would be useful to decision-makers. For a further explanation of uncertainty analysis as it relates to MSATs for transportation related projects see *Appendix C – Prototype Language for Compliance with 40 CFR 1502.22*.

Based on the available information and mapping provided, it appears that two properties will be a possible UST/HAZMAT impact to this project. They are as follows:

- Thortons Parcel 14
- Evan Motors Parcel 16

Thortons Parcel 14 – Upon review of alternate No. 1 mapping, it appears that the underground storage tank system (USTS) is far enough away from the proposed right of way (PROW) to where it is likely not to pose a threat from a petroleum release. However if deep excavations (greater than three feet in depth) are proposed in this area you may want to consider conducting Phase II activities to ensure there are no petroleum impacted soils requiring removal and off-site disposal.

In regards to alternate No. 2, it appears the PROW is now close enough to the USTS to where it could pose a threat of encountering petroleum impacted soils. I would recommend conducting a Phase II if alternate No. 2 is selected.

<u>Evan Motors Parcel 16</u> – Upon reviewing both alternates, it appears that the PROW goes directly through the USTS. Therefore, regardless of which alternate is chosen I would recommend a Phase II at this property. Since the PROW goes through the USTS, the USTS will need to closed/removed in accordance with the Underground Storage Tank Branch regulations.



In addition if the project corridor for either alternate acquires residential housing/commercial structures they will need to have asbestos inspections if they are to be demolished and possibly if relocated.
