

TALKING POINTS

KEY MESSAGES:

- Driver licensing issuance is moving from the Office of the Circuit Court Clerk in every county to Driver Licensing Regional Offices in select counties operated by the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet. A phased county-by-county transition of licensing services will end by June 30, 2022 and regional offices will serve as your new home to renew, replace or apply for a license, permit or ID.
- Driver Licensing Regional Offices take licensing to the next level by offering Kentuckians more choices and modern services than ever before. Regional offices offer online appointment scheduling, REAL ID card versions, 4 or 8-year card lifespans, and soon, online license renewal.
- Visit drive.ky.gov to learn more about your renewal options, to schedule an appointment, and find the nearest regional office location.
- Kentucky State Police will continue to oversee all driver testing. Visit the KSP website to schedule an appointment and identify your testing location.

TALKING POINTS

- Kentucky is taking licensing to the next level with new versions of driving credentials and a new statewide issuance model.
- Between now and June 30, 2022, licenses will no longer be issued by circuit court clerks in every county. Instead, the Kentucky

Transportation Cabinet's network of new Driver Licensing Regional Offices will be the place to apply for and renew driver's licenses.

- The change is being made gradually. The new model was passed through legislation in 2020 and the phased, county-by-county transfer of licensing services is done in partnership with the Administrative Office of the Courts and each county's Office of Circuit Court Clerk.
- Currently, 67 Kentucky counties have transferred licensing duties to Driver Licensing Regional Offices.
- Seven more counties are scheduled to transfer services in November bringing the total at the months end to 74.
- Starting Nov. 29, residents of the following counties will be referred to any Driver Licensing Regional Office: Allen, Butler, Christian, Edmonson, Nicholas, Perry, and Powell.
- Issuing licenses, permits and state ID cards is the <u>only</u> business of the KYTC regional offices.
- The new system puts Kentuckians in the driver's seat by offering Kentuckians more choices and modern services than ever before.
- For the first time ever, Kentuckians can now skip a trip to an office and renew their driver's license online or by mail. It will maintain the same card version and lifespan of their current license. Visit drive.ky.gov to learn more.
- Kentuckians can choose the following options:
 - Choose between a REAL ID credential or a new, standardissue credential. REAL IDs are the only license version that can be used to pass through TSA security checkpoints, enter military bases and enter federal buildings once federal REAL ID enforcement starts May 3, 2023.
 - o Choose between a card that lasts for four or eight years.
 - Choose an appointment slot by booking online.

- Choose the regional office you want to visit, regardless of where you live.
- With a focus on great customer service, regional offices offer modern conveniences to take the licensing experience to a new level. Some key new features include:
 - Online appointment scheduling to get you in and out as quickly as possible. Walk-in service will continue but are on a firstcome, first-served basis.
 - Licenses will be mailed to your home and you'll walk away with a temporary paper credential after your transaction. No waiting around again for the physical card to print. This delayed issuance of the hard credential is a security feature.
 - Residents of counties without a permanent Driver Licensing Regional Office still can be served close to home at periodic "pop-up" office sites.
- While there is a lot that's changing, one thing that has <u>not</u> changed: Kentucky State Police will continue to administer all written and driver testing for permits, operator licenses and CDLs. Residents can visit the Kentucky State Police website to schedule driver testing appointments and learn where testing will be performed. http://kentuckystatepolice.org/driver-testing/
- Currently, there are 20 regional offices strategically placed across the state and more office locations are planned to open in the coming months.
